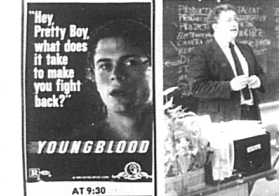

more than nine percent. The price consumers paid, however, declined by only 2.1 percent, from \$1.40 a pound to \$1.37. Pork prices to the farmer declined 89 almost eight percent, and held steady at the grocery counter.
Larry Jones, an Extension agricultural economist at UK, said it is unusual for retail prices to lag behind shifts in prices paid to farmers.
"This will work on the upside, too. Consumer prices will take a downward turn eventually, and prices paid to farmers will move back up. There have been times when consumer prices were going down while prices paid to farmers were going up. Jones said.
"There is no evidence that anybody is trying to engage any body. This is just the system working," Parlett said.
So, what's going to happen this year?
"As we see things now, I don't see a whole lot of change. Food supplies are large. But meats may recover, but not enough to compensate for 20 percent decreases in the price paid to farmers for grains," Parlett said.
Prices paid to farmers are expected to hold nearly steady through 1986, while prices at the grocery store continue to climb. But increases in total consumer income are expected to offset retail food prices increases, leaving consumers spending a smaller and smaller portion of their paycheck on groceries.
