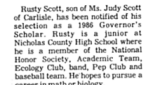

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Local scholar to attend academic camp at Centre and U of K



Rusty Scott, son of Mr. Judy Scott of Carlisle, has been notified of his selection as a 1986 Governor's Scholar. Rusty is a junior at Nicholas County High School where he is a member of the National Honor Society, Academic Team, Ecology Club, band, Pep Club and baseball team. He hopes to pursue a career in math or biology.

The scholars will be at Centre College and the University of Kentucky for five weeks from June 24 to July 25.

The Governor's Scholars Program is free of charge to students. It is financed by a partnership of state government, including the Office of the Governor, and a number of private businesses and foundations.

Governor Collins noted that the Governor's Scholars Program raised its standards for admission this year and yet received even more applications than in the past.

Students will be evenly divided between the Centre and UK campuses. Each scholar chooses a major course of study from 11 areas ranging from mathematics to creative arts, including such subjects as cultural anthropology and philosophy. In addition, students select seminars in subject areas different from their major course.

Each school district is allowed to make a specific number of nominations that corresponds to the district's size.

To meet 1986 program requirements, students had to:

— Score in the 96th percentile or above on the KIST (statewide achievement test);

— Take the PSAT/NMST

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Fiscal court meeting reported

Charles K. Watkins, representing the Nicholas County Water District, appeared before Nicholas Fiscal Court Tuesday evening April 22 to discuss the county-owned water line at the east end of Carlisle.

County attorney Joseph H. Cooley was appointed to check into the legal aspects whereby the county would turn this water line over to the water district. Watkins requested Judge/Executive Reese Smoot draw conditions as to what the county expects, what prior commitments have been made and a copy of the contract with the City of Carlisle for water rates. Another meeting will be scheduled for further discussion.

Magistrates were presented for review a copy of the plan of land on U.S. 48 and Miller Lane where Charles Lane plans to build a subdivision. County was requested to take over maintenance of roads in

Lexington, Margaret Hunter, Beulah and Phillip Childers and Stephanie Duncan were present to discuss their request for rooms to open a Day Care Center at the old hospital building.

Discussion involved the monthly lease fee of \$25 and meals that would be provided for children.

Court agreed to grant CALL permission to sublease any part of the hospital with terms to be worked out between the parties involved.

County agreed to accept dedication of said streets for utility, shopping, walking and future maintenance, upon completion of grading and paving of all streets by Lane.

Nancy and Willie Hogg appeared before Court with questions regarding Nicholas County Hospital's policy in insurance. Judge Smoot, telephone hospital administrator Rob Heister, who came to the meeting and explained that he had requested all insurance companies furnish him a copy of their policies. He also discussed buying a new policy in regard to ambulance service.

Approved various transfers of funds in County Budget for 1985-86 fiscal year.

— Set up a new appropriation account at the General Expense Fund, Code No. 41-42, Building Repairs, Landfill and County Farm, in the amount of \$2,000.

Approved claim of county clerk Rose Scott for preparation of index vehicle tax bills for 1986. The county clerk is allowed 20 cents each for calculating and preparing a tax bill for 3,801 Nicholas County motor vehicle accounts, which totals \$1,680.20. Half of this amount (\$840.10) is paid by Fiscal Court and half by the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Ellis Tavern case study

A case study of Ellis Tavern, a stone landmark in Nicholas County, will be presented by owner Charles Golden as a feature of Kentucky's first preservation conference.

The event on May 8-9 at the Brown Hotel in Louisville will also include restoration techniques for brick, log and frame buildings presented by owners from across Kentucky.

Technical workshops on various preservation issues will also be a part of this event sponsored by the Kentucky Heritage Council. The

theme of the conference is Preservation in Perspective. It will be organized around four tracks of workshops: (1) The Preservation of Old Houses, (2) The Preservation of the Neighborhood, (3) The Preservation of the Community, and (4) Kentucky Images: Gateways and

This year marks the 20th anniversary of the passage of the 1966 National Historic Preservation Act and the creation of the Kentucky Heritage Commission. "This conference will provide a good opportunity to reflect on past accomplishments and plan for the future of this effort in Kentucky," said David Morgan, director of the Kentucky Heritage Council.

The registration fee to attend the two-day conference is \$40. The Brown Hotel will be offering their rooms at a special rate to conference participants.
