

Crop weather continues very dry

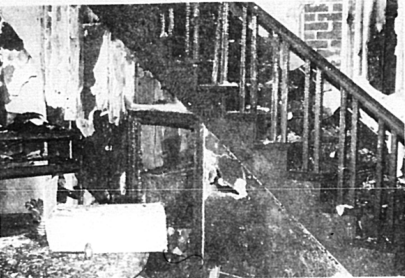
Last week, warm temperatures and scattered rainfall enabled farmers to average 24 days in the field out of a possible 64 days. Statewide, soil moisture was 28 percent very short, 52 percent short and only 20 percent adequate. The Eastern half of the state is the driest at almost all of the areas in the very short moisture range.

The tobacco crop continues highly variable with regard to maturity and potential yield. If the crop received rain at needed times or was irrigated, the crop looks good, but where moisture was lacking, yields have been reduced. Some farmers continue to top their tobacco and spray for mecker control, other farmers are cutting and hauling their crop. As of Sunday, 32 percent of the state's first acreage had been cut. This compares to 22 percent last year and 20 percent for average.

Overall condition of tobacco last week was two percent very poor, nine percent poor, 49 percent fair, 19 percent good and one percent excellent.

Work of an arsonist

State police are continuing their search for the person or persons who set fire to the J.E. Anderson farm home on Mayville Road August 8. Nicholas County fire chief Mark Hughes said an accelerant of some kind had been thrown on the stairs above and then ignited.
