 Kentucky's basketball team got a few of them on national television at North Carolina State last Sunday and it should stand the wider in good stead with the NCAA Tournament just around the corner.
 From a media hype standpoint—and with plenty of promotion from NBC analyst Al McGuire—UK's national TV date did these things:
 • Affirmed that Kentucky—under new management—remains one of the nation's best college basketball programs.
 • Affirmed that this team is talented enough, will coach well enough, that it might not be overrated.
 • Fatigue, look-alike, no excuses explain away a loss of a good non-conference game.
 • Lagged for on the road on a given Sunday in the middle of the season.
 • Improved potential of the team play in both offense and defense in its second year.
 • Potential national success, particularly big men—that there are opportunities to play at UK.
 • The 44th North Carolina State win did these things:
 • Tactical soundness, the out-of-conference spirit affixed UK's national TV date.
 • Eddie Sutton an excellent coach.
 • UK's club needs work.
 • UK has better better performer shooting to make Kenny Walker more effective under the Huger.
 • Harden and Ed Davender were six of UK's Weston Bennett (18).
 • Showed UK's most glaring weakness—18 bench players.
 • Reserves played—Richard Madison and Cedric Johnson—and not very effectively.
 • A more consistent contribution must come from Madison and Johnson.
 • UK's performance on this national TV date probably seriously impaired Walker's chances of being named college player of the year.
 • Ironically, and as stated in this report prior to the season, Walker's chances for national honors this season was locked into how well his teammates would be able to take pressure off him by way of perimeter shooting.
Other observations
 • Cheers to Nick Al McGuire for inspiring Walker's talents although UK's pride did not get a full opportunity to display them.
 • JERS UK Network radio broadcasters Cawood Ledford and Ralph Huger for making excuses for UK's loss. Fatigue and spotty officiating are fair tradeoffs UK officials can't about coming into Sunday's game.
 • Return UK cabled a fireworks celebration, the team got national exposure and Sutton got a look at how his club performs in a hostile arena—and where it needs work.
 • Comment: Critics that nobody's consistent fatigue etc./before a game.

 • McGuire during NBC's halftime lectures.
 • Sutton on his view of the Kentucky job: "As long as I'm in the job that I'm doing my best each I can take the criticism."
 • Sutton on "cheating out his players": "I tell you, when I get on you it's nothing personal. I'm just trying to get you to be the best player you can be."
 • Comment: Potential recruits and Jeter Momo and dad love it.
 • JERS to McGuire a cynical reply when Dick Edberg asked the fact question: "When will the honeymoon be over (for Sutton at Kentucky)?"
 • McGuire: "When the honeymoon goes, ha, ha."
 • Comment: Balaony.
Recruiting
 • UK's Sutton said last week that 69 Harvey Grant from Independence Community College in Kansas had visited the Kentucky campus.
 • Who is Grant?
 • They list Grant at 6-9, 195 pounds, but he's more like 6-7 and skinny.
 • A writer in Kansas said that the player who Kentucky had had Kivator's team (12-0) in the Kansas Jayhawk Conference.
 • Grant is said to be a good "point" player. At 6'7", 200 lbs. he was averaging 22 points and 11 rebounds per game this season.
 • "Bye?" Grant is not an inside type player, but is an excellent shooter from 15 feet in, null says. "He's a good offensive player, but if he went to someone like Kentucky, my guess is he'd sit on the bench."
 • Reports are there are two prospects in the Jayhawk Conference who are better than Grant. The manager's best is said to be Greg Padden, a 6-7 sophomore at Sedalia, Okla. And, there is Keith Smart, a 6-4 sophomore guard at Garden City, Kan. Community College.
 • Padden carries a 20 ppg.
 • Derrick Miller, a 6-4, 170-pounder from Savannah, Ga. Bible Baptist High School has been on UK's list for several months. So far he is averaging 24 points and 10 rebounds per game this season.
 • Miller is paper thin, but has long arms and is reported to have excellent shooting range.
 • Miller is said to hold until spring when he reportedly will choose Georgetown, Del/Pa. or Kentucky.
 • According to a source in Savannah, Miller was "headed to Kentucky before the scandal this year."



Ledford scores

Bluesjackets Steve Ledford gets two of his total seven points in the game with Bourbon County Saturday night in the local gym. He was leading rebounder for the team with 11. Nicholas suffered a tough loss to the colts, 67-62.

 The Nicholas County Bluesjackets played the Bourbon County Colts at home last Saturday night and were able to stay close in scoring throughout the contest. They showed much improvement over the season-opening 67-62 loss at Bourbon County.
 The Jackets fell behind early, but used a strong full court press defense to gain leads and easy baskets. Some Bourbon County "fast break" baskets in the second quarter.
 The Rebels trailed by seven points at the end of the third quarter and pulled to within three in the fourth period, but fell short 67-62 at the end. Gary Dotson led Nicholas with a fine all-round performance. He had 25 points, seven rebounds and six assists. Sophomore Kelly Brookshire also played well with 17 points and six assists. Today added 10 points and led in assists with five. Steve Ledford had 11 rebounds to lead the team and contributed seven points. Gannon Bryant had six points and Philly Caldwell tallied two.
 The Jackets out-rebounded a bigger Bourbon County team 27-16. Nicholas made 20 of 46 shots from the field for a 43 percent. They made 12 of 18 from the foul line for 66 1/2 percent.
 Bourbon made 62 percent from the field, hitting 31 out of 50 and they made five of seven from the line for 71 percent.

To the People of Kentucky:

 Members of the Nicholas County Fiscal Court

We have examined the statements of receipts, disbursements and excess fees of the County Clerk and Sheriff of Nicholas County for the year ended Dec. 31, 1984. Our examination was made in accordance with the Standards for Audits of Governmental Organizations, Programs, Activities and Functions, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and accordingly, including such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As recommended by the State Local Finance Officer, pursuant to the Revised Statute of 1892, the accompanying financial statements are prepared primarily on a cash basis. Consequently, certain revenues and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when a liability is incurred. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly the receipts, disbursements and excess fees of the County Clerk and Sheriff for the year ended Dec. 31, 1984, in conformity with the accounting principles described above, applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding years.

We also conducted tests of compliance with state laws and regulations, and unless otherwise noted below, the tested items were in compliance with applicable state laws and regulations. During our examination, nothing came to our attention to cause us to believe that the untested items were not in compliance.

We did not conduct a study and evaluation of internal accounting controls as we concluded that the audit could be performed more efficiently by expanding substantive audit tests. Therefore, we placed very little reliance on the internal accounting control system.

FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Our comments are intended to be constructive. The purpose of such a report is to point out areas for improvement. The absence of extensive comments of a complimentary nature does not imply the efficient accounting and compliance procedures are deficient or un sound. Accordingly, we offer the accompanying recommendations.

(1) Sheriff Should Comply With Uniform System of Accounts
 The Sheriff's financial records were not maintained in accordance with the Uniform System of Accounts. Problems areas include lack of payroll records, all records were not posted nor deposited into an official account and auto expenses were not documented properly. We recommended the Sheriff seek the aid of the State Local Finance Office for assistance in maintaining correct financial records.

(2) Sheriff Should Collect Advertising Costs
 The Sheriff failed to collect advertising costs and Sheriff's fee on delinquent tax bills as required by KRS 134.30. We recommended the Sheriff begin collecting advertising costs.

(3) Sheriff Should Not Comingle Public and Private Funds
 The Sheriff was in violation of KRS 64.000 which prohibits the commingling of public and private funds. Tax money totaling \$13,000 were deposited in the fee account in which the Sheriff's fee is deposited on personal check. We recommended the Sheriff maintain a strict separation of private and public funds.

We are confident the above findings and recommendations will be useful to the Sheriff in managing the operations of his office in a manner consistent with effective accounting and compliance controls.
