"For 32 years tobacco farmers had no valid voice in fixing the price of their product. They had no bargaining power in the market, hence the wisdom and necessity of price supports."

"The 1948 Act gave them production control and price rights, beginning with the market season of Jan. 1, 1949. For 65 years they have had fair prices. They do not want to lose their marketing rights."

"The Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association has shown that the program of production control and price supports can be made effective for all farm commodities, if for each commodity the program is made conformable to the

1986 deer season dates announced

Kentucky's 1986 deer gun season will open Nov. 8 (the second Saturday in November), according to a motion adopted by the Fish and Wildlife Commission at its quarterly meeting in Frankfort Dec. 12. The season will continue for three, five or ten consecutive days, depending on zone regulations to be established later.

The deer bow hunting season will run from Oct. 1 through Dec. 31, 1986, with cross bows permitted only during the Nov. 18-27 portion of the archery season. A special bow season for muzzle-loading firearms is set for Dec. 6.
