Nicholas County 9.9% jobless

Number jobs rates in 1982 Kentucky counties were higher than October reports, according to the figures released December 19 in the Census for Human Resources. In 15 counties the rates were lower in November, while in three counties the rates were the same as in October.
 The state's civilian labor force totaled 14,900 from October 1, 1985 and 15,300 in November 1984. The civilian labor force includes non-military people who are working and unemployed. It does not include anyone who is unemployed but not actively looking for work.

Seventy-seven counties reported unemployment rates of 10 percent or higher in November, compared to 71 in October and 68 in November 1984. There were 10 counties reporting higher jobless rates than in November 1984, 13 had lower rates. The increase in unemployment rates on the local level reflected the statewide increase from a percent rate decreased from 9.8 percent in October to 9.1 percent in November. The comparable state and national rates are not seasonally adjusted.

Convergence Insufficiency in Seniors

Many elderly, motivated patients can be helped to improve convergence with a good eye condition that has deteriorated with age.

What is convergence? It's the ability of the two eyes to fixate on the same object at a reasonable reading distance. When this visual task must be accomplished by straining the eye muscles, headaches and discomfort occur and the individual of any age is discouraged from reading or other pastimes which require seeing close objects.

The problem of convergence insufficiency reappears in substantial numbers of persons between the age of 50 to 60 or older for many of these older people, convergence ability can be improved with glasses that include prism, and with visual training exercises that play a strong role in correcting convergence insufficiencies in both children and adults.
