Last Tuesday morning, January 14, local members of the Economic Development Board of the Chamber of Commerce met in Frankfort with the secretary of the State Department of Commerce Carroll Knicely, and Brad Richardson, director of Marketing and Industrial Development for the Commerce Department.

The group meeting included Mark Mattox, Chamber president; John Burke, chairman, Industrial Marketing Committee; Horace (Spud) Marshall, Industrial Marketing Committee; Frankie Hughes, Economic Development Committee; Carlisle Luster, Chairman and Chamber of Commerce director; Bill Hamilton, Industrial Development consultant with Aslan, Inc., Washington, D.C. and Wayne Gaussois, local businessman.

According to Mattox, Richardson stressed that industrial development does not occur overnight. In order to be effective, the development process must be ongoing. He suggested that an industrial activity be formed in Carlisle and that the city should participate in the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce's Certified Cities Program. He also stated that the city and county governments and the people of Carlisle and Nicholas County must be cooperative and have a positive attitude about their community.

A reception was held at the Capital Plaza Hotel in Frankfort that evening where over half of an estimated 150 persons attended were local citizens.

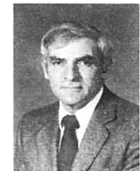
## Rep. Adrain K. Arnold to seek re-election

## Single-car accident sends four to local hospital

A single-car accident early Sunday morning sent four people to the local hospital with injuries ranging from facial lacerations to spine injuries.

According to the police report filed by patrolman James Coy, the accident occurred at 12:31 a.m. Jan. 19, 1986 on East Main Street near Burns' Auto Sales. Driver of the east-bound vehicle was Thomas W. Crawford, 601 Nicholas Square. Passengers were his wife, Jan Crawford, Kim Northern and Evilla Howard, both of 275 East Main. The car reportedly left the road and traveled about 150 feet before hitting a tree and landing in Powell Neal's yard.

All four were taken to the Nicholas County Hospital. At present time Tuesday, Northern had been dismissed to go home. Howard was reported in stable condition with a spine injury. Mrs. Crawford received mostly facial lacerations and was in fair condition. Mr. Crawford received extensive injuries, including fractured ribs and lacerations to the face.
