Health Tips

Reye's Syndrome

Generally we think of flu and chicken pox as mild troublesome illnesses of children and teens. Hardly do we think of them as life threatening. However, in rare instances, Reye's syndrome, which can be fatal, could follow either disease when the child seems to be recovering.

Reye's syndrome, first described in 1963, may appear with symptoms of drowsiness, persistent vomiting, violent headache, lethargy, intelligence, disorientation and delirium. Call your doctor immediately should any of these symptoms occur. You must act quickly. Do not wait to see if the symptoms will subside. More lives can be saved when treatment is started as soon as possible.

We do not know the cause of Reye's syndrome, but there is a great deal of evidence pointing to a connection between children and teens who were given aspirin for chicken pox or flu. Wild speculation is in the development of Reye's syndrome does give aspirin for these illnesses. Have your doctor prescribe if any medication is needed.

Some manufacturers of aspirin and aspirin products have voluntarily printed Reye's syndrome warnings on the label. Others have not. Parents need to continually seek information concerning the health of their children.

December farm prices up slightly over last month

Farmers received a small Christmas present last month when prices for farm products increased slightly over November prices.

"Unfortunately, at the same time, prices were generally lower than last year during this time," said Agriculture Commissioner David E. Borewell.

Corn was up slightly in mid-December to \$1.49 from November's \$1.42. This is below the December 1984 price of \$1.56.

Soybeans continued an upward trend in December, going from \$8.11 in November to \$8.29 in December. However, this is still below the December 1984 price of \$8.18.

Wheat followed the same trend, rising from \$3.14 in November to \$3.21 in December, but remaining lower than the December 1984 price of \$3.41.

Prices in the preholiday barley sales averaged \$10.18 per hundredweight. The bid-wide average was \$19.64 per hundredweight.

Livestock prices in Kentucky varied, as cattle prices were generally lower at mid-December, while hog prices showed a slight increase.

The mid-December beef cattle price of \$44 was down from the mid-November average of \$45.10, but was higher than the December 1984 average of \$43.

Hog prices averaged \$44.20 in November, increasing to \$45.80 per hundredweight by mid-December. This is below the December 1984 price of \$46.20.

Prices in the preholiday turkey sales averaged \$10.18 per hundredweight. The bid-wide average was \$19.64 per hundredweight.
