Although two months away, Carlisle/Nicholas County Chamber of Commerce officials are already finding inquiries about the 1986 Court Days celebration.

"Based on what I've heard so far, I'd say we'll have double the number of people here selling or exhibiting over last year," chamber president and court days chairman Mark Mattox predicted.

The event, resurrected last year after a hiatus of many years, is scheduled for three days — Friday, Saturday and Sunday, September 26-28 — around the courthouse grounds. Last year's inaugural was only a two-day affair. A number of persons (vendors) suggested the sponsors add an extra day to the popular event.

Cost of booth space is \$20 for one day, \$30 for two and \$40 for all three days.

Entertainment plans are being discussed, including a possible band contest, singing by church groups Sunday afternoon, and public exhibits by crafts people, homemakers and hospital personnel.

Mattox asked that anyone interested in putting on exhibitions should call him at 259-2726 during the day or 259-2722 at night.

City seeks money for water, sewers

Suggestions under study to solve waste water problem at knitting plant

The city of Carlisle, at a called meeting of council last Thursday night gave second reading to an ordinance allowing the city to apply for \$1,000,000 in revenue bonds at a low rate of interest from funds made available to the Kentucky Municipal League.

The money is needed to finance improvements to the water system and waste water treatment plant necessary to meet state and federal mandates. It will also pay for a computer and a new fire truck the city is required to purchase in 1987.

Application for the money was made Friday, well ahead of the July 31 filing deadline.

Discussion at the meeting also included a possible block grant, up to \$1 million. The city might qualify for five percent loan money, it was pointed out.

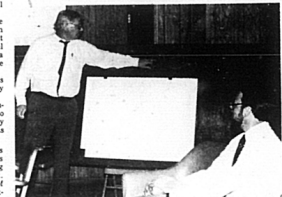
COUNCIL HEARD suggestions concerning Jockey International's knitting plant effluent being discharged into Brushy Creek. Barry Modemann, vice-president of Jockey, explained a plan which would comply with regulations governing chlorine in waste water and at the same time operate at full capacity using 500,000 gallons of water daily instead of running at the current 60 percent (300,000 gallons) of capacity.

Mademann said that Charlie Marzetta, deputy commissioner of the state's Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet, suggested mixing the city's treated waste water with RICE effluent, thus "killing two birds with one stone."

Simply stated, the combined waste water would then be pumped through a 26-inch cast iron pipe to Licking River, where it would be discharged into the stream's

15,000,000 gallons-per-day flow. Chloride content tested at this point would be an "insignificant" 15 parts per million, well under the allowable 5000. RICE effluent currently registers at an unacceptable 1,800, 2,000 parts per million at the point of discharge into zero-flow Brushy Creek.

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Explains plan via blackboard

Barry Modemann, vice president of textile operations for Jockey International, outlines his plan for a reverse flow pipe which would carry waste water discharged from the knitting plant and from the city's treatment plant to Licking River at Thursday's special meeting of city council, headed by Bob Smallwood, with GRW Engineers of Lexington, who also spoke.
