Centre reaches goal of quality, quantity

At the earliest date in the past 12 years, Centre College has met its goal for the number of incoming freshmen it is seeking to enroll for the next academic year.
At the same time, in terms of academic quality, Centre's new freshmen class — one of the best in the college's history.
Tom McKee, Centre's Director of Admissions, said that 222 high school seniors, including Matthew Guthrie of Nicholas County, have accepted offers of admission to enroll at Centre next September. He said the college's goal for the class of 1990 was 225 so as to keep Centre's enrollment at its capacity of 800 students. Centre has 800 students this year and expects the same enrollment in the fall.
"THE QUALITY of our incoming freshmen class is comparable to last year's," which was one of the strongest in the Centre's history, by measures normally used to indicate academic quality," McKee said. Those measures are class rank and scores on college entrance exams, he said.
Among incoming freshmen next fall, 58 percent ranked in the top 10 percent of their high schools and the median score on the Scholastic Aptitude Test, which is the 90th percentile among all college-bound high school seniors in the United States.
The 1985-86 freshmen class of 220 students also had a median score of

36 on the ACT and included 27 percent that ranked in the top 10 percent of their high school classes.
According to McKee, the incoming freshmen next fall will be from 19 states, including Kentucky. The class will consist of 26 percent of its students from out-of-state.
The enrollment will be 119 women and 101 men. Seventy-five percent will come from public schools, 15 percent from parochial schools and 10 percent from independent (private) schools — percentages that have remained constant for the past five years, McKee said.
McKee also noted that about 55 percent of the incoming freshmen will receive financial aid on the basis of demonstrated need. Although final figures are not available, the average award will be more than \$6,000, he said. Tuition, room, board and fees will be \$9,975 in 1987.

Food prices register slight gain

Shoppers at Kentucky grocery stores will notice higher prices for many staples during May, according to the state's food price index by 1.2 percent, according to Kentucky Bureau's marketbasket survey.
The increases were evident for such staples as beef, pork, milk, lettuce and tomatoes, leaving the average cost of the 40-item marketbasket of foods at \$71.73, compared to \$70.18 in April. The May figure, however, remained some three percent below the year-ago level, when the same food selection cost \$75.86.
Poultry was the notable exception to the upward in May, dropping an impressive 13 percent over the 30-day period. Egg prices led the decline in the category, with large size eggs 18 cents a dozen cheaper at 68 cents average, and extra large of a dime at 75 cents.
CHEEKY BREASTS, an item growing in popularity with shoppers, registered a price fall of 34 cents a pound, costing \$1.33. That was the lowest price for the choice poultry cut since last October.
Among the four food groupings which showed price increases, the average cost of the 10-item list went up with a 3.1 percent hike. Other increases in food prices: 2.3 percent higher, pork, a 2.2 percent increase, and beef, a 1.4 percent rise.
Typical of the items in those groups were 7-lb steaks, up 18 cents to \$2.84 a pound; pork chops, 14 cents higher to \$2.18 a pound; and iceberg lettuce, showing a 20-cent gain to \$2.79.
