A former Carlisle man was pictured in a front page story about Memorial Day parades in the North Altitude (Mass.) Journal-Bulletin May 26. Andrew Jackson (Jack) Cassidy was the subject of a story entitled "A Pearl Harbor Survivor Can't Forget." The 63-year-old Navy veteran first saw the light of day here in Nicholas County but has lived in North Altitude since his discharge from service. Jack entered the Navy in 1944 and was aboard the battleship West Virginia when it was attacked by Japanese planes and sunk on Oct. 31, 1941 at Pearl Harbor. Cassidy, who was in his 20's at the time, remembers running from the gallery as the ship was being badly hit, but to his battle station during the attack. He said he was unable to get to the battle station early because he was hit in the leg by a water hose that was sent hurtling across the deck. According to the account in the paper, "when I did get there it was just a big hole," Cassidy said. "It was the only one in the battle station crew that lived."
