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noticed that it had again been suggested that angle parking be installed on Locust Street between Main and Chestnut Streets. Parking spaces along the side of the court house would remain as they are. Council voted in favor of the suggestion. The change-over will be made in about two weeks.

Tyler reported one of the spaces could be used as a handicapped space. Mayor Bentz stated that he felt that there were already enough (handicapped spaces) in town, and they were being abused by persons who were not handicapped.

An ordinance concerning the job position of radio dispatcher was presented to Council. It is a position not now covered in the ordinance.

The HIGDON situation on Main Street between Broadway and Locust Streets was discussed. Mayor Bentz again suggested that a sign about seemed to be the answer. The health department has deemed it a health hazard, with the city being responsible for handling the situation.

Constructing a handicapped ramp at the corner of Main and Broadway streets was discussed. Mayor Bentz stated that he estimated \$5,500 to \$3,800 of that figure would be for labor. The city will furnish all materials. He also noted that part of the steps at that corner could be left intact.

Sharon Jones, assistant city clerk, took the minutes for city clerk Mary Tapp, who was in the hospital.
