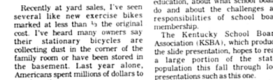

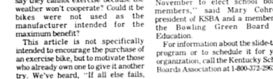

Eye Openers

The cornea of the eye is the clear, transparent window on the front of the eye. It has two important functions: — It transmits light to the inside of the eye, and — It helps focus the light rays to produce a clear image.

In a thorough eye examination your optometrist checks the health of the cornea and measures the amount of astigmatism (irregularity of corneal shape). It may call for visual correction. Measurement of the cornea also helps determine the proper curvature of contact lenses.

The cornea should be protected from scarring. Although it has effective internal healing powers, severe scarring can damage vision by reducing the cornea's transparency. Corneal abrasions are sometimes caused by overwearing contact lenses. When this happens, lenses should be removed and not reinserted until the abrasion has healed completely. Anyone who suspects damage to the cornea from an abrasion (which is usually accompanied by pain) should seek professional eye care immediately.
