interest," Conlan said. The plan was tabled last year when council decided water lines would have to be increased to higher for many residents today.

STATE REP. Pete Worthington referred to new alternatives to Jockey's needs which he had outlined in recent letters to the Carlinville mayor.

They included adding a booster pump to establish water line to river, repairing dam at the reservoir, and installing a special lead to affect actual cost of raw water to augment locally Creek flow.

Worthington has opposed dumping water from the knottin plant in Licking River. Instead, he concurs with the plan which would mix the effluent with the city's treated water below the treatment plant.

The Mercury learned late Monday that the cost-free package the state is offering to help Jockey and the city includes installation of a 15-inch water line to Licking River, using present eight-inch line to carry water from the knottin plant, and installing booster pump to water tower at Jockey plant, among other things. No cost figures were available.

Commerce Cabinet Secretary Carl Kneely told former resident Mayor Eugene Glasgow that the state was picking up the tab as its part of the deal, assuming it could get a commitment of some kind from Jockey concerning future plans to maintain here.

Glasgow relayed the information to former mayor Frankie Hughes, now a member of the Industrial Development Authority. The information was discussed at a meeting of IDA Monday.

A news release detaining the state's role had not been received at press-time Tuesday.

**Backfires damage car, pick up truck**  
The Nicholas County Fire Department investigated two fires last week caused by car backfires.

On Nov. 4 at 4 p.m., firemen were called to put out a fire in a 1977 Ford Sugar Creek and a 1978 Ford pickup truck. The truck was a complete loss.

Earlier the same day a Chevrolet Nova owned by Meredith Jackson of Barterville sustained damage to the engine compartment when the car backfired.

The number of Kentuckians working in September reached 1,000,000, just behind the 1,001,000 record set in October 1984.
