Kentucky authors to be featured in Nicholas schools

Several famous Kentucky authors will soon read their works on command for students at Nicholas County High School through an informative, exciting new audio tape series prepared by the University of Kentucky. Volume 1 of "The Kentucky Authors Series" - an audio tape presentation with accompanying text - was presented to the school in appreciation of its "excellent working relationship with UK's independent study program," says Paul Pfanzagl, Jr., director, UK University Extension. Through the UK independent study program, those living in Nicholas County can earn high school credits from Nicholas County High School through correspondence courses from UK. The first four authors featured in the series are James Baker Hall, James Hall, Gurney Norman and Thomas Morton. Each recording describes a Kentucky writer's development and includes excerpts from his works. Hall, Smith, and Norman, active authors, read passages from their works in the recordings. Four more authors will eventually be added to complete Volume 1 of the series by Pfanzagl. These, too, will be provided to the school's library. The "Kentucky Authors Series" was developed by UK University Extension, with the assistance of English. "It reflects UK's commitment to academic excellence and our desire to share our resources with our neighbors," says Pfanzagl.

MSU adds academic course

Employers believe it adds prestige to hire someone with a "bachelor's degree," he continued. Objectives of the new program will be to provide disciplinary instruction in anatomy, physiology, radiography, and veterinary clinical pathology. Graduates will be qualified to assist veterinarians in all duties except diagnosing, prescribing of treatment and performance of surgical procedures. "Offering a bachelor's degree will give students the opportunity to pursue additional fields in the area of their chosen careers," said Dr. Judy Willard, Department of Agriculture and Natural Resources chair. "They can now select electives in other related fields. We are delighted with this addition," she added. The four-year degree program has been recognized for its excellence and we expect no less for the B.S. degree program," he added. The four-year degree program will allow students more opportunities of different types of jobs, according to Dr. Charles Derwick, Director of Applied Science and Technology Dept. "With this additional training, graduates will be considered professionals and qualified to assume positions of more responsibility," said Dr. Derwick. The program, begun in 1974, has been fully accredited by the American Veterinary Medical Association since 1977. Plans are now under way to renovate present facilities to allow for implementation of the new program and one new faculty position is expected to be added by the fall semester. Graduates of the two-year program would be called veterinary technicians while participants in the four-year program would be veterinary technologists.
