Bentz unfolds water grant status at Tuesday meeting

"It's just another stumbling block," Carlisle Mayor Lee Bentz told a special meeting of Carlisle City Council, Tuesday night.

Tipton worked for PCA for four years, when he resigned to pursue full-time farming.
In August of 1986, Tipton returned to Farm Credit Services for six months until deciding to run for Nicholas County Circuit Clerk.
Tipton and his wife, Doris, have an 8 year old daughter, Tamara, and live at Oldstage Creek Road.
Incumbent Sally Watkins was elected in May, 1981.
Watkins is the wife of Dorsey Lynn Watkins, and the mother of one son, Todd Gannace, who is completing his second year at Mayville Community College.
Watkins is a native of Clark County, and has lived in Nicholas County since 1975.
Both candidates for circuit clerk have been interviewed, each asked the same six questions.
Those questions and the candidates' answers are as follows:
Q. Why are you seeking this office?
Tipton: "I feel like I'm qualified after taking the test, which took six hours to complete."

"I like working with people, and I find the job interesting."

Worthington fighting water plan

Kentucky State Representative Pete Worthington (D-Ewing) is fighting a plan to construct a new water line for the City of Carlisle.
Worthington, speaking before a state committee on Capital Construction Oversight, hammered away at the plan approved by several state agencies and private engineering firms.
According to Carlisle Mayor Lee Bentz, the funds promised the city by the State of Kentucky for construction of the proposed water line are being held up, until the committee has a chance to review the available information.
Speaking before the committee in Frankfort Monday, Worthington offered information to support his claim the discharge from Jockey International's facility would damage the water supply of several communities in his district.
In his remarks, Worthington said Jockey is allowed to remove its dyeing operation discharge into the Linking River, instead of Brushy Fork Creek. It may damage the water supply of about 2,500 families in its legislative district of Mason, Fleming and Robertson counties.
Water districts which would be affected, according to Worthington, would include West Fleming, Fleming County, South Mason, Buffalo Trace and Mount Olivet.
Worthington made comments to the committee about the City of Carlisle's ability to pay for its portion of the construction.
"These remarks left Carlisle Mayor Lee Bentz furious."
"He doesn't even live in Nicholas County, and has no connection with the City of Carlisle. How can he have what the financial situation of Carlisle is first hand" the mayor questioned.
At the Frankfort meeting, Bentz gave a report of the city's financial status, but apparently it wasn't enough for the committee.
Bentz explained the city has about \$300,000 in its water ac-

"I've never been contacted by the judge or any of the magistrates about raising the rent... I have nothing to write."
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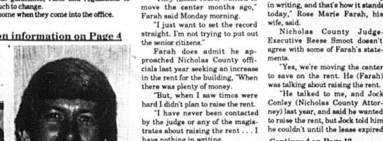
