Kentucky crop survey is released

Planted acreage of corn, soybeans and sorghum are showing sharp declines this year, according to Kentucky Agricultural Commissioner David Stewart.

Kentucky farmers have planted 1.3 million acres of corn in 1987, down 15 percent from last year and the smallest acreage since 1983. As of July 5, 97 percent of the crop is in either good or excellent condition, with 55 percent of the crop milking.

Soybean planted area have declined to the lowest levels since 1974, Stewart said. With 56 percent of the crop planted as of July 5, 14

million acres were planted, estimated that only 1.05 million acres will be planted in soybeans this year, down 13 percent from 1986.

Approximately 50 percent of the soybeans are blooming, with some fields beginning to set pods.

Overall, 1987 soybean acreage in Kentucky will change very little from last year. It is estimated that 145,000 acres of barley soybeans will be grown, a 4 percent decrease from 1986.

However, the acreage of dark to beans is expected to be 35 percent less than last year due to a significant reduction in planting.

An estimated 2.6 million acres of hay will be harvested this year.
