 This is generally done when there is a strong current with which to contend.
 Father and son were fishing off Mike's boat very hard. When he reached in a 14 inch snapper on his line, only five inches of the fish was visible. The other nine inches had been chewed off. Hartert surmises by a barracuda or a shark.
 Hartert explained that when these fish swim horizontally or sharks attack people swimming in the ocean is that a swimmer on the surface makes the same sound as a fish struggling in the water. Spear fishermen are also at risk.
 But people swimming under the water make very little noise, except for their air bubbles.
 The cost per diver for equipment runs from \$1,000 to \$1,500, accord-

ing to Hartert. Cost breakdown in air tank \$120, BC Jacket \$300 is reflected, but having buoyancy compensation, by pushing a button, the vest will fill with air allowing the diver to float to surface, or air can be let out of the vest, making him sink. Mike said he had \$150, but said \$170 to \$200 is more expensive area are compressed, regulator and gauges - \$500.
 Hartert explained that the regular and gauges are extremely important because they "connect the tank to you". They let the diver know how much air is in the tank, and at what depth he is swimming. Fifty feet is 15 feet in the average depth for most scuba divers. Advanced divers will go as deep as 120 to 130 feet, but cannot stay. Depth that deep as it takes a regular time to decompress when ascending, and that uses up a considerable amount of air from the diver's tank.

When surfacing, a diver should not come up any faster than 60 feet per minute or he can suffer from decompression sickness or "bends" as most people know it.
 "One part of diving is moving this stuff around," Hartert explained as he was helping Mike into his gear. An air tank weighs 30 pounds when full, and that's quite a load on a 90 pound frame such as Mike's. He's tough, though. His father puts it on, steady like a bit, and he stands straight and tall.
 The day of the interview, Hartert and Mike were on their way to Cave Run, along with a friend, to practice their favorite sport, and maybe see some wide-mouth bass face to face!
 Not every kid can say that, right? Mike!
