 Nicholas County basketball stuns Bourbon County in the 100th Bourbon, Tuesday night.

The Lee Cruise coached Jackets staved off Bourbon County for both halves.

Nicholas County jumped out 17-0 lead at the end of the first quarter, and extended its lead to 25 points with 3:49 left in the first half.

Bourbon County broke the game scoring in six Bryan Latham hit one of two free throws, with 6:54 to play in the first quarter.

Nicholas County's Andy Anderson hit the first two points of the season for the Blazepucks with a layup after a steal to give the Jackets ahead 21.

Bourbon County tied the score with a free throw by Derick Wright. This time the lead shifted to Bourbon County.

With 4:17 left in the first quarter, the lead shifted to Nicholas County as Wright canned a six foot shot from the right side.

Two straight fouls by the Colonels' Tony Tipton kept Bourbon County away from the basket.

With 4:17 left in the first quarter, Tipton hit a 15-foot jumper, added a banker from the right side at the 1:57 mark, and Anderson

counted one from the left with 1:13 left.

Lee Cruise coached the Colonels to a 69-59 victory over Bourbon County Tuesday night.

Nicholas County continued to roll during the second half, leading Bourbon County 22-10 with 1:00 left on the clock.

Bourbon County extended its lead to 48-13 in the opening quarter, but Nicholas County tied the score at 48-13 with 4:10 left to play.

Campbell added both ends of the bonus and a layup to offset a follow-up basket by Warner and led 52-17 with 2:45 left to play.

Down the stretch Kenny went to work to get reserves some playing time.

Cats hammer Cincy now 2-0; face 2-0 Indiana on Saturday

The University of Kentucky Wildcats pulled into an early lead and kept it to win at home 101-77 over the University of Cincinnati.

The first game in six years Kentucky has scored 100 points. UK opened the lead and held Cincinnati with a strong defense, leading 58-38 at the half.

Going into the second half, the Wildcats' defense slacked up somewhat, allowing Cincinnati to come within 14, the "direct Cincinnati" could come in the second half. Kentucky held off 11 straight points after a timeout, and coasted to the win.

Jim Chapman led the Cats, with 22, to three game honors with Chapman.

Tony McLendon, Cincinnati's consistently high scorer, was held to only seven points by the defensive program of Ed Davenport.

Bob Lock was named Player of the Game, by the UK television network, after gaining 18 points, 13 rebounds, hitting six for six free throws and six for eight from the field.

Kentucky faces Indiana at the Hooper Dome in Indianapolis, Saturday afternoon.

Bobbi Knight's Wildcats, coming off a stunning 76-59 victory against Notre Dame, matches Kentucky with a 20 season mark.

The Lady Jackets responded with their only real rally of the game as Christian Bassell hit a layup with 1:03 left in the quarter, and following a steal by Warner connected on a follow-up shot from the left side to put the Bourbon County lead to 10-0.

A crowd of a little over 200 watched as Bourbon County jumped out to a 6-0 lead by controlling the inside.

Bobby Warner broke the scoring ice for NCHS with two free throws, but Bourbon County was off again taking a 10-2 lead with 2:28 left in the opening quarter.

Lady Jacket's Coach Barbara

Kim Campbell found two of her game high 12 points six feet out in the lane to lift Bourbon to a 12-6 advantage but, the Lady Jackets' Tony Moore found the range from 18 feet out to put the lead back to four, 12-4, with 3:17 showing on the clock, in the first quarter.

Campbell came back with a follow-up shot from the left side of the lane to boost Bourbon County's lead to 14-8 and the visitors held the six point advantage at the quarter's end.

Bobbi Myser connected on two follow-ups in the next two minutes to give Bourbon a 40-12 advantage with 3:50 to play in the third quarter.

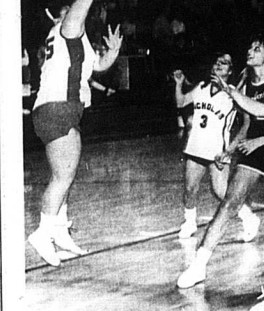
