New areas of study urged

Recent vocational education programs need to put increased emphasis on health, science, and verbal skills, and there is a need for more publicity and promotional efforts.

These findings came from a survey made as part of a research and development project funded by the Office of Vocational Education, Kentucky Department of Education. It was conducted by Ann Vance and Dr. Hugh O'Brien of Northern Kentucky University.

Titled "Innovative Vocational Education Business Lookups," the project dealt with employer perceptions of vocational students, programs, and services.

The study revealed that there is a trend in place responsibility for additional and interpersonal skills on vocational education, as well as job skills.

Other findings concluded that "vocational education needs to take the initiative to reposition business and industry."

"Vocational lookups — such as on programs and representative from business serving as advisory committees — remain successful."

Regarding employer perceptions, the survey also found that:

- 78 percent agree vocational education is a positive response.
- 77 percent believe that vocational education had a high or exceptional economic value.
- 74 percent felt vocational education should prepare students for specific skills.

More than 60 percent of businesses surveyed indicated they had not been approached by vocational education centers for input or advice.

76 percent of the employers would hire or consider hiring vocational

trainees. In addition, 56 percent had a candidate in high level of satisfaction with vocational education training.

"Continuous improvement in working with vocational education as advisory committee members and/or in sharing equipment."

Among the recommendations in the creation of a vocational look here to develop an action plan based on issues raised by the study. Another called for development of a linkage model for use throughout the state. A third suggested examining the vocational education curriculum at all levels, and finally, exploring networking possibilities within the business community to develop new dialogue.
