Weekend College
Maysville Community College will be offering a series of Saturday morning classes when the Spring Semester begins in January.

This "Weekend College" concept has been started at several Universities of Kentucky community colleges and at other major colleges and universities in metropolitan areas.

Weekend programs have met with considerable success in serving the needs of area residents holding down full-time jobs who want to begin or return to college.

Current planning is to offer at least five courses during the coming Spring Semester.

Courses being planned include Writing I, Introduction to Psychology, Nutrition, Applied Mathematics, and Accounting. Those offerings may be of particular interest to those interested in attending in the college's new Dental Hygiene Program which will begin fall force during the summer.

JTPA Programs

The Maysville Community College JTPA Job Training Partnership Act Program will offer job training in five occupational specialties beginning January 14.

Ronald Isaac, Child and Adult Care, Medical Records Management, Secretarial Bookkeeping, and Banking are the specialties to be taught. Twelve students will be accepted for this Spring Semester offering.

Each student will enroll and complete two related college courses and participate in a job experience for a total of 272 hours of training. In addition to the training, students will be placed in area businesses for 250 hours of paid on-the-job training. All wages and fringe benefits will be paid through the program, at no cost to the employer.

Students for the program will be selected by the employer and the program coordinator and will meet certain income requirements. Students must be out of high school and interested in pursuing a career.

Area businesses interested in cooperative education in the Dental Hygiene Program will benefit by having prospective employees to choose from. The program will provide employment needs of specific business. There will be an opportunity to try out employees at no cost and receive 90 hours of individual labor. Dental hygiene apps

Applications for Maysville Community College's Dental Hygiene Program are now being accepted in the college Admissions Office.

The deadline for applications is March 1. Enrollment in the Middle

Dental Hygiene Program will be limited to state residents and students in the Admissions Office health forms, and ACT scores must be received in the Admissions Office before applications will be considered for admission to the program. Those wanting to apply who have not taken the American College Test (ACT) or the Career Planning and Placement Test (CPPT) should make arrangements now with the MCC Student Services Office to take one of those tests. The next ACT Test is February 13 with January 13 being the deadline for signing up for the test.

Preference for admission to the program will be given to those prospective students who rank high on their ACT or CPPT, who rank high in high school grade point average, who have some prior college credits and who have some experience in dental offices. For those wanting to get a head start in college and enhance the possibility of admission to the Dental Hygiene Program, MCC is offering four classes scheduled in Saturday hours, each Saturday beginning January 17. Registration for these classes will be held at the college January 7 and 8, 7 p.m., in the college auditorium. Requirements for admission, course requirements, and other related information will be offered. A film overview of the dental hygiene profession and information from Dr. Joe Lynch, Coordinator of the program, will be presented.

The overall statewide winner in the contest, which was coordinated by the department's Division of School Food Services, was Becky Murphy, a senior at Spencer County High School, who was also first place winner for grades seven through 12.

Her entry portrays students with trays of junk food looking enviously at the nutritious school lunch on a tray carried by a boy in a blue Kentucky sweater.

A total of 450 entries were submitted at the state level after local contests were held on the theme "School Lunch: It Makes a World of Difference."

"We were delighted with the quality of the entries," Superintendent of Public Instruction Alvin McWhorter said. "They not only show imagination and artistic talent but reflect a good understanding of the aims of the school lunch program."

Second place honors for students in grades seven through 12 went to Lee Ann Pymon, an eighth grader at Denning High School in Laurel County.

Winning first place for grades four through six was Jenny Wilkins, a fourth grader at Golden Elementary School in Clinton County.

In second place was Jayson Manning, a sixth grader at East Elementary School in Morgan County.

In first place for students in kindergarten through grade three was kindergarten student in Logan County.

Robin Houshelt, a third grader at LBJ Elementary in Breathitt County, was second.

The winners in each category received \$75 savings bonds, and those in second place received \$50 savings bonds.

An additional \$50 bond went to the overall winner.

Vet program accredited

Morehead State University's Veterinary Technology Program has received full re-accreditation from the AVMA Committee on Animal Technician Activities and Training which studied the program's curriculum, faculty members, research projects and students, according to Dr. Joseph M. Williams, program coordinator.

The faculty, staff and students involved in this program should be very proud of their record of achievement," said MSU President A. D. Albright.

In fact, the vet tech program has repeatedly attracted national recognition which reflects on the University as a whole," Albright added.

The past year has been an exciting one for the program which saw one of its graduates earn the highest score in the nation on the National Board Examination for Animal Technicians, according to Dr. Judy Wilard, department chair.

In addition, MSU has asked the Kentucky Council on Higher Education to approve the offering of a four-year degree in veterinary technology in addition to its associate degree program. If approved, it would be one of only three in the nation.

Dr. Applegate and Dr. Wilard are to be commended for their efforts in making this program one of the University's finest," said Dr. Charles Derricksen, dean of the college.
