New farm quota deadline set**

New tobacco growers may apply for barley quotas until February 15, 1987, through the ASIS office at 1501 Main Street, Carlinville.

This program applies to those growers who are planting tobacco for the first time or those who have not grown tobacco for five years or more. It also applies to those wanting to increase tobacco quotas to increase size on a temporary basis.

"Normally, ASIS only receives about 10 applications per year because most of the farms in Nicholas County already grow barley tobacco and have their growing quotas set," said Elizabeth Hughes of the ASIS office.

"Farmers with small parcels of land—less acres to 30 acres—want to establish a tobacco lease contract in order to be able to market their barley," Hughes said.

Another factor affecting the new planting of tobacco is the "Double-Header Legislation" passed in 1980, which prohibits farm program benefits for crop acres as ground decreased by ASIS to be "available" or "wet land." In the case of barley tobacco, the benefit of price supports would be denied.

Also involved in the "double-header" law is the requirement for land planted in 1980 or 1981 to be evaluated by ASIS for the purpose of implementing a farm plan for land use. Farmers of land already planted but never 1981 and 1982 have until 1990 to comply with the law.

The applicant must qualify as a new grower, an applicant must meet all the following requirements:

- Must not own or have any ownership interest in any other tobacco farm in the United States for which a tobacco quota of any kind of tobacco is established for the current year.
- The applicant must own, or have recently available, the equipment and other facilities necessary to produce barley tobacco.
- The applicant must expect to derive more than fifty percent of the current year income from farming. This includes income of the spouse.
- The applicant must have experience in producing, harvesting, and marketing barley tobacco by sharing in a crop share program, lease, or operator status at least two of the previous five years or if farm that had an effective quota.
- The applicant must own a farm.

**Eye Openers**

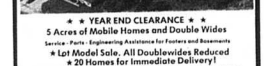
**How We Read**

American readers read from left to right, Israeli from right to left and Japanese read up and down. Smooth eye movements, so essential to reading, are learned.

Regardless of direction, the fluent reader does not look at one word at a time. Instead, the eyes take in a series of words which are then sent to the brain for interpretation. The eyes then move smoothly to the next group of words. This continues throughout the entire reading process. The average reader "sees" about 3 to 5 groups of words per line. An unfamiliar word may require a second look and slows down the reading process, as the brain questions the meaning of the message it receives from the eyes.

Fast readers see longer series of words with each glance. Therefore, fewer glances per line, and per page, are required.

Reading glasses, bifocals, and sometimes vision training enables many patients to read more efficiently without strain.
