

GENERAL NEWS Representative Remarks

For the third time in its history, the Kentucky General Assembly met in Organizational Session last week, a four-day meeting that set the stage for next year's regular session of the Legislature.

In the House of Representatives, we like our colleagues down the hall in the Senate-elected our leadership and received our committee assignments for the coming session, and for the session itself.

Committee chairs were also named. I was selected as Chairman of the House Counties and Special Districts Committee.

As expected, House Speaker Don Blanford, D-Philippi, was re-elected for a second term as the chamber's top leader.

As speaker, Blanford presides over the House when it is in session and serves, along with the Senate president pro tem, as co-chairman of the Legislative Research Commission.

Representative Pete Worthington, D-Ewing, was reelected speaker pro tem for a second term.

Farmers will need the card

Farmers wishing to purchase restricted-use pesticides for sprouting may encounter difficulty. The state department of agriculture will once again attempt to enforce the federally mandated restricted-use pesticide law.

People needing to purchase these products will need a personal card authorizing the purchase of these restricted-use products.

The state has employees now field personnel to check farm supply establishments to see if they are requiring proof of the restricted-use card before the sale of the product.

Farmers needing to either renew their present card or get one for the first time may do so by attending a restricted-use meeting to be held at the Nicholas County Extension office January 21 at 7 p.m. in the basement of the Nicholas County Courthouse.

In fact, the House Democratic leadership remained essentially in place, with one exception: Representative Judy Richards of Bowling Green will replace Representative Donmerney of Bellevue as majority caucus chairman. Political changes, however, marked the election of Republican leadership.

Study Allen of Morgantown was elected minority leader, defeating incumbent minority leader Richard Turner of Tompkinsville.

Ken Harper of Crestview Hills was chosen minority caucus chairman, replacing Pearl Day LeVey of Kets Island. Bill Lutz of Valley Station was elected minority whip, the job Allen had held.

The Organizational Session is a relatively recent arrival on the legislative scene, having been approved by voters as part of a constitutional amendment in 1979.

The first Organizational Session was held in 1981, and the off-year meeting is exactly that. We meet to get our leadership and our committees organized so we can really get off to a fast start when the "real" 90-day session rolls around, from January through mid-April of every numbered year.

With committees now in place and leadership positions filled, we can schedule our legislative calendar to work forward in earnest to the

hard job of preparing for that session.

It's interesting to note that in the 1986 session, our 100-member body will contain 22 newcomers. One additional freshman is yet to be elected, owing to the untimely death of Representative-elect Willy Hoover of Lawrenceburg last month.

So we will certainly take advantage of the opening year of study and preparation in joint House-Senate committees to acquaint ourselves thoroughly with the tough issues facing us.

And let me emphasize that we need your help in this effort. We are elected to serve you — to your eyes, ears and voice in Frankfort — and your views are our main consideration in shaping public policy.
