The first few times a husband and wife entertain together at home can be stressful, however, so the following tips can help in planning the early events.

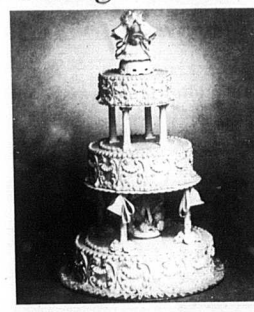
