# Lifeline program starts at Harrison Memorial

A new dimension of healthcare has come to the Central Kentucky area, including all of Nicholas County, with the implementation of Harrison Memorial Hospital's Lifeline program. The Lifeline emergency response system helping elderly, handicapped, or otherwise isolated individuals maintain their independence. These individuals can live in their own homes, secure in the knowledge that help is only the push of a button away. The Lifeline system consists of three components. The first is a wireless beeper which the individual can wear around the neck or the wrist. The second unit attaches directly to their home telephone system. The third unit is a base monitor, which is maintained at Harrison Memorial Hospital's Emergency Room. How the System Works When a subscriber is in trouble, he/she presses the beeper, which activates the Lifeline unit to telephone message to the hospital. When the Lifeline alarm sounds in the Emergency Room, the staff telephone the subscriber to find out what type of help is needed. If there is no answer, a responder is called to check on the individual. A responder is a friend, relative, or neighbor who has agreed to go to the subscriber's home, when a call for help is sent. If medical assistance is needed, or a responder cannot be reached, an ambulance will be sent to the patient's home. The establishment of the Lifeline unit has been made possible by a donation of one-half the purchase price of the base unit by the Harrison Memorial Hospital Auxiliary. Harrison Memorial will supply the remainder of the necessary cash to purchase the base unit and install the beeper in the first 500 homes. Beyond their donation, members of the Hospital's Auxiliary have also volunteered to perform the necessary regular monthly checks on the telephone equipment.

The Commissioner asks, "How much is a local health department worth?" In an average day we see 27 restaurants, 18 grocery stores, 2 schools, 14 mobile home parks, 121 new sewer systems, 4 churches, 14 milk producers and food manufacturers. We provide 2,700 family planning visits.

681 WIC (Women, Infants, and Children) visits presented and 110 WIC child visits. We held 61 child safety seats, and presented more local professionals in care of diabetes patients. We provided 128 immunizations, 726 fluoride treatments, 546 home health visits, 217 hypertension education visits and 353 Pap smears along with breast self-examination instructions.

On an average day we add about 1,200 new patients, many of them too poor to afford private care, but too poor enough to qualify for a Medicaid card.

These photochromic lenses contain millions of light-sensitive crystals that react to both visible and ultraviolet light. They darken in sunlight and get lighter indoors. They darken more on sunny days than on cloudy ones. The process of change takes approximately 60 seconds. These extraordinary lenses are available in brown or grey tints and in most prescriptions.

After a short "break-in" period, most wearers are delighted with the amount of sunlight protection these lenses give them and with the clear vision they provide indoors. They are just as effective for bifocal users as they are for single vision ones.
