Shonert to speak Friday

Former owner, publisher and editor of *The Falmouth Outlook*, Warren J. Shonert Jr., will be guest speaker at the annual dinner meeting of the Nicholas County Historical Society, June 15, at the Depot.

Shonert will be the subject of his 30 minute address.

Election of the society's 14 directors will be held during the meeting, which will be presided over by Henry Potts Young, president.

The social hour is scheduled to begin at 6 p.m. at the Station Garden Patio, with dinner at 7 p.m.

Shonert, who will be accompanied by his wife Catherine, ran *The Falmouth Outlook* for 45 years. It was one of the largest Kentucky weeklies with a circulation near 7,000 in the early 1950s. He sold the paper in 1968.

In 1972, he was appointed to a four year term as Regent of Northern Kentucky University.

In 1984, he presented a rare book Kentucky library to NEU valued over \$200,000.

In addition, he gave the com-

plete files of *The Falmouth Outlook*, 1907-1985 to NEU, where they may be researched today through microfilm.

Shonert is a descendant of John Walker, founder of Falmouth, "an original town proprietor," a member of the Virginia Legislature in Richmond, commissioned as Captain on the frontier, the first Kentucky Legislature from Bourbon County, a founder with his brother, Edward, of the first blackhouse in Lexington, (Massachusetts).

Walker is the only known white man who assisted Simon Kenton in building his fort at Washington, Kentucky.

John Walker served with General George Washington at Valley Forge, and was in the battles of Germantown.

He is buried at Banker Hill in Pendleton County, Kentucky.

Shonert is a son of a revolutionary descendant of Col. Alexander Daniel of Papp.

Shonert is a member of the Baptist Church. He is a member of the

Cons of the Revolution and the Sons of the American Revolution.

Upon retirement, Shonert was recognized by NEU for his library gifts, which consists of the early school (Pendleton Academy) record three volumes and the 1794 City of Falmouth records and a minute book as well as many Civil War, union, Confederate and Abraham Lincoln rare books.

In addition there were documents of all presidents, Daniel Boone, Simon Kenton, Benjamin Logan, and John Walker.

On March 26, 1987 when another fine Kentucky library was given to NEU, Shonert was referred to as the one who started the Rare Book Collection at the NEU History Library.
