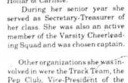
**Paula Lee Hamm**

Linda, 80 percent of the office operational costs, according to Herlet.  
County funding has not been adequate up until now, Herlet added.  
"Will you change the tax rate someone down the road?" Magistrate Orville Atkinson asked.  
Herlet informed the court the county extension district board will be willing to pay \$250 per month rent for office space in the basement of the courthouse.  
"I see no need to start charging rent," Nicholas County Judge-Ex-

ecutive Bevee Smart said, "and taking it out of taxpayers' money."  
Smart questioned the necessity of the occupational taxes collected would be used for county extension services.  
Twenty five percent was her answer, prompting Atkinson's statement, "If this board is formed, we would possibly lower the occupational tax rate."  
"I feel this is a fair tax and it works smoothly," Herlet said.  
With no Kentucky counties using this procedure to fund county extension services, Herlet said he was rounding up copies of Nicholas extension for Herlet. Herlet said he'd get to have a judge or fiscal court have any procedure.

For many years there were a big part of the parade featuring the queen candidates, Organizations

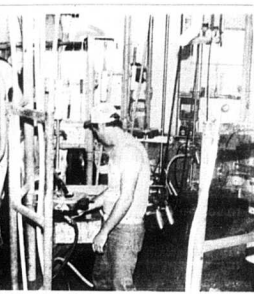
and clubs throughout the county would have entries depicting the historical theme of the Fourth of July.
