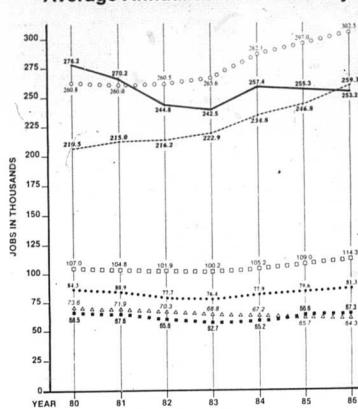

Employment levels establish records in 1986

Average Annual Jobs in Kentucky



Five of Kentucky's top 10 job categories established record employment levels in 1986, an only change occurred in the Kentucky Cabinet...

Trade jobs dominated Kentucky's record employment picture for the first straight year as an increase of 1,900 jobs pushed the employment in this category to a record 228,000 in 1986.

The services sector also registered the greatest increase with 12,300 new jobs - a review of non-farm employment in Kentucky shows that the state's chief employer...

Manufacturing, which was the state's chief employer from the mid-1960s through 1981, lost 2,100 jobs in 1986...

Although the services sector has lost ground since the 1979 recession, it has maintained a seventh-place ranking in 1986...

Education continued to hold on fourth place, the position it has occupied since 1973. The addition of 3,300 jobs means 113,000 people were working in education in 1986.

Eye Openers

Good visual habits should be encouraged when children are young. In addition to sitting up straight when reading and having enough illumination on the desk, stool or playing table, the following habits should be developed.

Encourage your child to look out the window in a moving car, or to play verbal games. It is good to read and write.

Give your child lots of outdoor exercise. The eyes need to see unlimited distance, as well as nearby objects. Chasing back and forth is good exercise for the eyes.

Allow your child to relax after 20 to 30 minutes of homework or reading. It is good to rest the eyes. Encourage him to break allows the eyes to relax.

Don't allow your child to sit too close to the television set. The best viewing distance for a television is 8 to 10 feet.
