Linville buys Main Street Market

As of February 18, Main Street Market, previously Jester Market, is under the new ownership of Jerry and Linda Linville at 239 Main Street in Carlisle.

At this point, other than changing the name, there are no plans to change the store from...

Linville does expect to make several changes in the operation of the market, including expanding the meat and produce departments. "We want to start carrying fresh examples in addition to a wider variety of cooked meats," said Linville. "For example, when they used to carry frankfurters, we want to have fresh. We also plan to sell fresh hamburger and pork chops."

Linville said the market will eventually carry country hams which will be sold cooked, boxed and sliced by the pound or in sandwiches.

Another change will be the addition of a deli counter. "The pricing was way out of range and we had a lot of complaints," said Linville. "I don't want to be in competition with the big stores, but at least our prices will be closer than they were."

According to Linville, the market will carry a larger grocery line, including variety for quick-buy customers who come in for one or two items.

Another feature will be a new ice cream case which will also hold frozen foods. Linville said it will be in place as soon as he can negotiate a price for the freezer.

The U.S. Department of Labor has certified the company as an "adversely affected employer" which provides assistance in employment and industries hurt by import competition.

The certification covers all workers laid off by the company between September 19, 1983 and November 1, 1986.

Laid-off employees who exhausted their unemployment insurance benefits before they were called back to work or found another job also may be eligible for retraining UI benefits.

Some workers laid off by the Cowden Manufacturing Company as part of a Trade Adjustment Assistance, Cabinet for Human Resources Secretary at Austin announced last week.

Linville said after one year in Winchester, they decided to move back to Carlisle because of the better location. "It's a big change working 11 hours on your feet when you're used to working nine to five behind a desk," Linville said.

They also own and operate Linville's Department Store, located next to the market. The Linville owned the store seven years before changing to the market.

He will feature, on a regular basis, special on selected items in conjunction with his desire to revamp the image and productivity of the market. "My main objective is to keep the store clean and well-stocked," Linville said.
