Kelly fights Heartbreak Hill in Boston Marathon

school track in the early hours of a day.

The Newton Hills of Boston
are a real test for the stamina
of marathon runners, and are part
of the course of the Boston
Marathon. There are four hills in
all, starting 17 miles into the race
and ending at 21 miles, the last
being the longest and steepest
known as Heartbreak Hill.

At the end of the race, racing
officials give the runners a time
of 12 to 16 hours set up to record
time and racing numbers of the
runners.

Three Kestavakans Gayle
know who were in the race come
in within minutes or seconds of
each other and himself, and they
never saw one another.
He explained that there were
just so many people, and so much
concentration on the part of the
runners that it was impossible to
judge what was going on around
you, except for the wild cheering
of the crowd which was constant
throughout the race.

Gayle describes her as "stringy
muscle and tight skin, and very
strong and I'm an actual teacher
who runs."

He also said she is rated the
"number one female marathon
runner" in the world.

To qualify for the Olympic
Marathon, a runner must
have a qualifying time of two
hours and 50 minutes.
A human interest story told by
Gayle concerns John Kelly, a racing
participant who is 60 years old
and has run in the Boston
Marathon for the last 60 years. He
has won three times. He has not
qualified the last several years, but
out of courtesy, he is allowed to
enter the race.

his pace times were: first mile, 10
minutes, 30 seconds; second and
third miles, nine minutes, 50 sec-
onds; at eight and nine miles, six
minutes, 30 seconds.

He explained the slow pace
times at the start of the race were
due to the slow start of the race
before the distance blinks out
among the runners.

When asked how he felt about
running in the Boston Marathon,
he replied, "I feel grateful that I'm
healthy enough to train for it. I feel
grateful that I qualified, and was
accepted in a constant."

You get the feeling that it's not
so much that he's excited to partici-
pate, as he wanted to participate.

And he'll tell you in the wink of
an eye that he's ready to go back
next year!

SEEKING ON THE JOB
The overworked - or more likely visually uncorrected - eyes send
