Road work set

Public Works Department has awarded a contract to resurface a total of 2.1 miles of various roads in Nicholas County. Hank Contracting Corporation of Paris received a \$110,000 contract to resurface 2.1 miles of Kentucky 11, the Carlisle - Jacksons Road from the Burdett County Road extending north 1.1 miles of County Road 1002, the Concord - Jacksons Road from County Road 1001 extending east to County Road 1002, and 1.4 miles of County Road 3021, Horse Hill Road from Kentucky 114 extending north.
