Eye Openers

THE PARTIALLY SIGHTED

Q. What does it mean when someone is partially sighted?
A. A person is partially sighted when visual acuity can only be corrected to a minimum of 20/70. That is even with corrective lenses, that person sees at 20 feet what a person with normal vision sees at 70 feet. Vision in one eye is correctable to 20/200 or less, and/or only a field of vision of 20° exists, that person is legally blind.
One in 20 Americans is partially sighted. Improved low vision aids, however, can give many partially sighted people better functional vision. There is a whole range of aids, including telescopic lenses, hand-held and mounted magnifiers and especially designed reading lenses with powers not available in conventional eyeglasses. The partially sighted and legally blind are entitled to special services from the Library of Congress, too, such as large print books and specially designed books for people who go to a community service by...

Beautiful: Tips from the Hart

Dear Hart, If a beautiful tip has to come for people? Just indicated a beautiful spring from my favorite aunt. They are called pearls. What is the difference between real and cultured pearls? Please tell me all you can how I can keep them beautiful. I want to pass them on to my daughter. Thank You.

Dear Hart, If a group of sand finds its way into an outer shell, the oyster will cover it over to prevent irritation, often a few years this... you have a pearl. This type of pearl is very rare. Cultured pearls are different only in the fact Mother Nature did not insert the grain of sand into the oyster's tissue, it is done by man. There are two types of cultured pearls, freshwater, which are usually round or oval-shaped, and the rare saltwater, which come in irregular shapes and are often called 'pearls'.

The luster of natural and cultured pearls come from inside the pearl. You can tell the difference between natural and cultured pearls by looking at the surface. Natural pearls have a soft, iridescent glow, while cultured pearls have a sharp, crystalline shine.
