Construction work on the \$700,000 Carlisle-Glen Line Extension Project officially began Monday morning when Mayor Frank Hughes, members of city council, engineers, Bluegrass A&E and other honored guests totaling about 50 persons, broke ground at the East End of Carlisle near the old hospital.

The action began by more than 200 residents of the Myers Station area to form a walkway next to an invalid one, according to County Attorney Jack Conley.
