He said the proposed facility is airtight, meeting the use of oxygen. "That would take the smell out of the sewer facility," Smallwood said.

Gabe Kelley, city sewer plant manager, asked if the facility should be increased to capacity to handle more sewage.

"Why not, jump it (facility sewage capacity) up to 500,000 gallons?"

Smallwood explained this isn't necessary since the proposed fa-

ility could, according to estimates, handle up to one million gallons a day.

Smallwood estimated that if council wants the facility larger, such as to 1,500,000 gallons capacity, it would cost an estimated \$300,000 to \$500,000.

Council member Cartmill Lester asked how much it would cost to make engineering changes.

"\$5,000 to \$10,000 more," Smallwood said.

**Distribution is set**

The Community Action Agency announced that U. S. Department of Agriculture surplus commodities including processed cheese, honey, milk and meat will be distributed to eligible area residents.

**Nicholas County falls to Bath**

**CARLELE** - Bath County rolled up a 4-0 first half points, en route to a 5-0 final score, against Nicholas County last Friday night.

The visiting Bath County team scored 22 points in each of the first two quarters to lead comfortably at intermission.

The visitors added a low score in the third quarter and the teams

remained scoreless for the remainder of the game.

The Jackets were without four regulars, including leading rusher Tim Fryman.

Senior quarterback Todd Day carried the ball five times for 52 yards. Frankie Johnson carried 15 times for 41 yards to lead the Jackets.

Day was three of 16 on the night passing for 40 yards. William Workman had one reception for 24 yards. Cutler Mathers hauled in one pass for 11 yards and Jerry Willis had the other reception for five yards.

The Jackets mustered only 177 yards total offense.

Mathes led Nicholas County's

defense with 17 tackles, including eight solo stops.

Johnson had 11 tackles, as did Kevin Hughes.

About the only thing we were able to do was reassert our presence during the game. We were forced to start three eighth graders and two freshmen.

NCHS Head Coach Robbie Barr

said of the game.

"The biggest thing was not to be intimidated or scared."

With the loss Nicholas County fell to 2-7.

"They had a scout at our game Friday, and they'll know what to expect from us."

"From what I can tell," Barr predicted, "they'll try to come at us out of a power I formation and play a 50 defense."
