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Jackets win first Fourth quarter pass seals win

MAYSVILLE—There were no words available to NCHS Head Football Coach Robbie Barr to really describe the Bluejackets' 14-0 win over Mason County, last Friday night.

The Bluejackets snapped their two game losing idiosyncrasy of the 1987 season with the dramatic road victory.

Quarterback Todd Day hooked up with runningback Tip Fryman for two touchdowns, the second one with 2:26 left in the game to post the victory.

On the night, it was the Tip Fryman show, with a generous cast of Bluejackets listed on the program. The visiting Jackets opened the scoring in the second quarter, on a Day to Fryman bomb, which covered 70 yards. The point after attempt failed and Nicholas County led, 6-0.

On the ensuing kickoff, Mason County set up a fake reverse, built a fine blocking wall, and roared to the end zone to tie the score. The Royals' attempt for a two point conversion failed and the score was knotted, 6-6.

It remained that way at intermission and through three quarters. With one extra left to play it gave every appearance of being a game of who scored, would win. As the jacket built a drive midway through the final frame, Day wound up and hit a ruling Fryman at the Mason County one, and Fryman slipped into the end zone.

"It was a great pass... and a great catch," Barr said. "Both of the touchdown passes were hard to catch for Fryman. On the first one he headed the ball in between to Mason County players and sprouted to the end zone."

"The second one was much the same. In fact, there was an interference flag thrown against Mason County on the one, but he had caught the ball and scored anyway," Barr said.

"Day had hands in his face on every pass, and was still able to get off some quality throws," Barr commented.

Day finished the game with seven of 15 passing, no interceptions and a total of 181 yards. Two of the passes were good for touchdowns.

Day also had a fine defensive showing with 8 tackles. Fryman led the charge for

Nicholas County with 179 yards rushing on 20 attempts and had three pass receptions for another 115 yards. His total for the night of 294 yards offense, was more than half of the Nicholas County total.

William Workman was moved from runningback to end and hooked in four passes for 66 yards and carried the ball one for nine yards.

Frankie Johnson had 14 carries

for 47 yards and Scott Irwin carried the ball four times for 19 yards.

"Mason County has a good team, and we were fortunate to win, especially with several turnovers," Barr said.

"We had two drives in the fourth win and look ahead to a tough Franklin opponent Friday night. We can't dwell on the win. We have to go back out there and play

hard again Friday night."

Frankfort, which dropped its first game of the season last Friday to Eminence, will come into the game 2-1.

"Frankfort has an experienced line. They play with speed and de-

ception. Franklin is always a tough coach to beat and plays hard."

"We've looked at some old films on Frankfort and I'm certain they'll play the same type of game as al-

ways. They're a straight ahead, hard hitting football team... year after year."

Kickoff for the season's first home game will be at 8 p.m.

The junior high jackets have a scrimmage scheduled for Thursday night and are set to open the season Monday, September 14, against Bath County at home.

Short agenda highlights court meeting

Nicholas County Fiscal Court met in regular session, Wednesday, September 2.

Discussion over placing one of the trucks being used by the county truck quarry on lot held by Woody Allison notified Nicholas County Judge Executive Renee Smouse is interested in purchasing one of the trucks.

In order for the county to sell the truck, it must be declared surplus property and then offered for bid. The second reading of the property tax ordinance was heard and approved.

There was no change in the proposed ordinance and rates will be set at rates previously announced. Shirley Gardner, Smouse's secretary, asked for approval to pay regularly received bills, to paid on receipt, such as utility bills. Bills must now wait to be paid until court's approval at regular meeting. Court members agreed to give Gardner the ability to pay bills received each month following regular meetings.

Gardner also asked court to legit looking for a part-time person to take over some of her responsibilities, as she will be administrator of the payroll-occupational tax for the county.

Although passed earlier in the year, fiscal court delayed collection until January pending action on a suit filed from Casey County opposing the constitutionality of passing a payroll tax in a county with less than 20,000 population.
