The overall team scored in the boys division were: Bath with 129, Mason, 114, Bourbon, 87, Rowan, 41, Lewis, 40, Prentiss, 37, Nicholas, 17 and Madison with 13.

In the girls division were: Bourbon with 156, Nicholas, 101, Fleming, 101, Madison, 70, Mason, 55, Bath, 41, Rowan, 21 and Lewis with 10.

Nicholas County individual results (points) were awarded to the top six in the 100 meter dash and Chris Compton with third in the 110 meter high hurdles. The 400 meter relay team consisting of Cam Griffith, Gary Berry, Frankie Johnson and Colton Mackin, took fourth.

The 800 meter relay team, John Gilvin, David Schmitt, Chad Bassett and David Spivey, was awarded fifth.

In the 2000 meter dash, James Hill took fifth.

The Nicholas County girls team met with Central Missouri leading the pack and taking first in the 100 meter hurdles and the 100 meter dash.

The 300 meter hurdles saw Rowland as a close second and Charita Hatten in fourth place. In the 200 and 400 meter dash, Angie Beach took sixth and fourth, respectively.

The 1600 meter run saw Nikki Shout take fourth and Belinda Brooks take fifth in the fifth place.
