MORRISHEAD, Ky. (AP) - Two junior college standouts and a high school star have signed national letters of intent to play basketball at Morehead State University, school officials announced Thursday.

The two players are Ron Barnes, a 6-6, 205-pound forward from Trinidad State Junior College in Colorado, and Elbert Boyd, a 6-5, 200-pound forward from Connor State Junior College in Oklahoma. Barnes averaged 12 points and nine rebounds per game last season, and led Trinidad to a 53-10 mark in his two years there. Boyd averaged 16 points and eight rebounds per game last year.

The high school star is Brett Roberts, a 6-7, 225-pound forward who averaged 24 points and 15 rebounds per game last season for South Webster High School in Ohio.

Cats' coaching staff looks hard at squad

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) - The Kentucky football staff is searching for the best players in the state for this year's season.

"We're young and immature in a lot of positions," said Jerry Eisenman, the quarterback coach and offensive coordinator. "We're limited on how much we can do right now."

During spring drills, Eisenman said, the staff has been experimenting with some things. Basically, it's very similar to what we've done in the past. Right now, we're trying to get people to fill in positions where we're weak and build some depth at positions.

Glenn Fehr, who started four games at quarterback last season, says he has a lock on the No. 1 job, but Eisenman said the biggest improvement has come from the backup quarterback Chris Broughton.

Broughton, a junior-to-be from Ashland, impressed the coaches as a freshman. Glen hurt his shoulder and returned slowly.

"He had a real mature approach," Eisenman said. "Now he's had surgery and he's come on strong. He's been getting that good on the ball."

Broughton and Fehr each passed for more than 100 yards during a scrimmage last Wednesday.

The coaches are also encouraged with Freddie Moggard, an all-league star at Cumberland High School, who was moved to safety during his freshman year last season before starting up a kicker.

Moggard is back at quarterback and Eisenman said he can "throw the ball like a baseball pitcher (which he was). He just needs to learn."

At running back, Kentucky is hoping to replace Mark Higley, the school's 2 career runner, by signing Ivy Joe Hunter himself. Hunter has had a history of injuries, but this far has survived the spring unscathed.

"Ivy Joe's been running well," Eisenman said. "But the running backs. Al Baker has been the most surprise. He's really come to the top as far as running the ball is concerned."

A freshman last season, Baker picked up 125 yards on 22 carries.

Eisenman said the biggest surprise has been Steve Phillips, a 6-0-2, 194-pound sophomore at the Don Fairchild, Ohio, school, by a knee problem. He did not catch a pass last season.

"But he has great hands," Eisenman said. "I think he's going to be it."
