Gretchen Judge serving time on Teen Board

 Camera flash, the runway lights with the music of high fashion as a host of models crowd waiting to view styles of the fall season.
 "So glad to be here," said Gretchen Judge, Senior at Nicholas County High School and a member of the McAlpin Teen Board, this is also hard work.
 "What does her new position involve?"
 Judge said, "We do modeling, but we also do promotions for the store (McAlpin)."
 She explained further, "Our first big modeling job will be the back to school fashion show August 6 at the Lexington Mall and the 13th at Turfman."
 "We are also going to hand out programs at the Barbara Ann School of Dance Recital."
 Other activities for Judge include live mannequin modeling.
 "We are going to model as mannequins at Christmas and maybe some before."
 "That first, we have got to learn the fit and cuts at some time, because some of the girls that made the board have never had any modeling experience before now," she said.
 Other immediate activities include a cheerleading clinic for five and six year olds called the Kids Clubhouse in which there will be face painting, cartoon characters and other activities on July 22 and 23.
 Judge added, "In August we will also have a Kentucky Celebrity Day and have a former Miss Kentucky and some of the University of Kentucky basketball players there."
 How did Judge become involved in the field of modeling?
 "I went to Barbizon in Lexington and they taught us a little about the modeling business including what makeup to wear for color, black and white pictures and other photographic sessions, social mannequins such as how to act, what to wear and runway modeling."
 Shortly after that Judge tried out for the teen board.
 "McAlpin puts an ad in the Herald Leader for applications and try out one or two year around May."
 The applicants then go in front of a panel of judges that include the fashion editor and Stacey Dyne, spent a lot of time in New York with Seventeen Magazine and really got a lot of ideas.
 Judge said, "I was the head of the teen board and fashion director, and her assistants Nikki Haddix and Stacey Dyne, spent a lot of time in New York with Seventeen Magazine and really got a lot of ideas."
 Judge will continue in the modeling field, but only as an sideline to her education.
 She concluded, "I may be going to the University of Kentucky and I want something part time while I am there and I think working at McAlpin would be just what I would want."

 "The majority of the girls are from Lexington with an overall number of 50 being chosen and 45 of those are from Lexington."

 "Our only highlight offensively was Morris' two hits. We did play well defensively with Mathes' diving catches and Allison's play behind third, but other than that, it was not a good night."
 Nicholas took their second defeat from Gretchen Park in Atlanta.
 "I have called a lot of games this year but saw only about three that could beat this team, they were excellent hitters and great pitchers."
 "Daniel Brown did a fine job as pitcher in this contest, and got a double, but we didn't pull it out."
 Allison summed up the tourney as a great experience for a deserving ball club.
 "I think this was an excellent experience for them, and they were well behaved."
 "Plus, it was a great experience for them. I did not get that experience until I was 28 and got to go to Wichita, Mo. they got to meet some new and different people and that was important."
 Coach was also proud of the community support the team received on such short notice.
 "I was really impressed with the community and how they got behind these kids."
 "At first, I didn't think people would realize how important this was, going to the nationals and representing the whole state of Kentucky."
 "But they were really there, and I think the kids made everyone proud."
 He concluded, "I was proud to be from Carlisle."

 She encouraged her daughter, Martha Paul, to enter, she said. Ironically, in one category, Paul won the blue, while her mother, the honor, was a red, she said.
 Tinsler was also pleased that her first time at a new recipe for chocolate and caramel fudge won blue ribbons.
