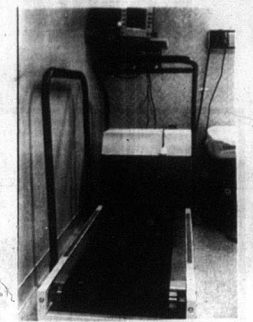

**To Nicholas Hospital Auxiliary donates \$10,700 machine**

The Nicholas County Health Care Auxiliary presented a check for \$10,700 to Johnson-Mathers Health Care for a Telemed. Treadmill and a three channel monitor. Ginny Kingsolver, Director of Volunteer Services at the Johnson-Mathers Health Care Center, explained that the Auxiliary worked on three specific projects each year to raise the money for the equipment.  
All proceeds from the Hospital Gift Shop were donated, as well as proceeds from the Hospital Benefit Dinner and Auction and the Christmas Bazaar.  
Bob Hester, hospital administrator, said he believes this is the largest single donation ever given to the hospital.  
The check will cover the cost of the equipment, which includes a treadmill, extra software for the electrocardiogram machine, and a three channel monitor that displays a patient in information, like blood pressure, as a certain takes the test.  
Dr. Pamela Combs will administer the tests in Nicholas County. She is an internist who also works in Bourbon County with their stress test equipment, Hester said.  
At the moment, he said, the machine is programmed for



one test that consists of five stages of elevation and speed on the treadmill. It can be programmed for up to 10 tests.  
Anyone can be tested, with or without physician's approval. Kingsolver said this is the reason they decided on this piece of equipment. She said they wanted to give something "broad based, that a lot of people in the area can use."  
Hester said people over forty who are prone to heart problems should have a stress test yearly. Athletes and people who feel like they are under stress and want to check for problems, should also consider having the test.  
The hospital can schedule a test in half an hour, rather than the patient taking a day off to travel to Lexington or Bourbon County for a test.  
Myrtle Ledford, who is the president of the Auxiliary, said she will be considering in choosing the stress test equipment. It should bring reasons into the hospital, she said.  
The fee for the test is inclusive, meaning there is no extra charge for Combs's presence and the like, Hester said.  
He said he wanted to express "much gratitude and appreciation" to the Auxiliary for giving them the donation. He said it was "the kind of thing we need to keep up."

**Eye Openers**

**UNEVEN VISION**  
If one eye is nearsighted and the other is farsighted, or glasses necessary?  
A. When one eye is nearsighted and the other is farsighted, the patient suffers from a condition called anisometropia. This could cause eye strain because the brain is receiving dissimilar images from each eye. Glasses may be prescribed to correct each eye, so the two eyes function as a team and see images in the same way. Frequently, however, contact lenses are far more effective in correcting this condition.  
If both eyes are nearsighted - or farsighted - but the visual acuity in each eye is significantly different, the condition is known as anisometropia. Here, too, glasses may correct the patient's blurred vision, but contact lenses are generally for more effective.

**WIC program guidelines changed**

Annual maximum income figures have changed and more Kentuckians "may" qualify for the Special Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC).  
For example, the annual maximum income for a family of four increased from \$20,720 to \$21,553. The maximum income increases between four and five percent for larger families.  
WIC provides nutritional information and specific foods to promote good health for low-income pregnant women, most mothers up to six months post-partum, and infants.  
Children up to five years old who have health problems that can be improved with good nutrition are also provided for.  
Danna Clark, a dietitian at the Nicholas County Health Department, said all people who use the program are screened to determine eligibility. They are also re-screened for eligibility every six months.  
Occasional nutrition lessons are provided. Clark said, but at the moment they are generally give individual counseling. The counseling covers nutritional topics such as the four basic food groups or how to get iron and certain vitamins into their diet. They also counsel participants according to specific health problems, she said, such as being overweight or overweight.  
Clark said about 200 Nicholas County residents receive WIC benefits.

**Cats looking for improvement**

LEXINGTON (AP) — The past three football seasons have been very frustrating for the Kentucky Wildcats. Kentucky likely will have more pass-oriented attack this season with quarterback Glenn Fob and talented tight end Charlie Darrington, both seniors.  
Fob played in nine games last season, starting in four, and completed 94 of 162 passes for 973 yards and six touchdowns. He also was intercepted eight times.  
Darrington, a preseason All-SEC pick, caught 26 passes for 365 yards and two touchdowns a year ago. Sophomore Mike Morse and senior Martin Pennington should be solid receivers at tight end.  
The Wildcats won't have Mark Hugg, an eighth-round draft choice by the Dallas Cowboys, who set a school single-season rushing mark of 1,278 yards last season and departed second on the career list.  
But they could have a more balanced backfield with senior Joe Hunter, sophomore Al Baker and junior-college transfer Alfred Rawls.  
Despite a nagging knee injury, Hunter rushed 100 times for 503 yards last year. Baker, a blue-clip recruit, two years ago, has been hampered by injuries, while Rawls had a sterling spring before suffering an ankle injury.  
Veterans Andy Murray and Darren Biherry, both juniors, give Kentucky strength at fullback while sophomore flanker Bill Logan could emerge as a big play performer.  
Among the missing is flanker Des Smith, who transferred to Western Kentucky after being suspended

**Board approves tourney sites**

CADIZ, Ky. (AP) — The Kentucky High School Athletic Association Board of Control voted Saturday to award the 1990 boys state basketball tournament to Louisville but postponed a decision on the 1991 site, officials said.  
The 1991 site will be determined after the board receives further clarification on hotel rates and availability, parking problems and other issues, said Julian Tackett, the KHSAA's sports information director.  
Under an agreement reached by both Louisville and Lexington, but not yet approved by the board, Louisville would get the four-day tournament in even-numbered years and Lexington would get it in odd-numbered years.
