Set-a-side program signup begins

December 19

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced the 1989 Feed Grain set-aside program with only a 10% acreage set-aside required. All signups, producers may elect to plant 10-25 percent of the program crops permitted acreage to soybeans or sunflowers while still protecting their crops acreage base history.

Planting intentions of soybeans and sunflowers will be reviewed to see if plantings will affect the 1989 soybean crop estimated price per bushel. Any limitations concerning this planting will be announced after an analysis of producers intentions.

Also in 1989 there will be a 1992 where producers may elect to set part or all of their permitted acreage aside and get a guaranteed deficiency payment on those bushels.

MAKEUP ALLERGIES
Allergies can have a definite effect on eye comfort, especially if you wear contact lenses. When allergies are caused by foods, itching and tearing will clear up when the particular food is identified and discontinued!
However, one of the chronic causes of eye allergies is eye makeup. Soaps and perfumes, too, can cause itching and swelling of the lids, thus making it difficult to wear contact lenses. Sometimes this type of allergic reaction sets in after prolonged use of a particular brand, as the user becomes sensitized to its ingredients.
Today there are many hypoallergenic eye shadows, mascaras, soaps, and other beauty products. You may have to go through several brands before finding one which does not produce a reaction. Before using any cosmetics on your lids and lashes, test a drop on the inside fold of your elbow for seven days. If itching or redness occurs, introduce new products to the eye area slowly. Test a small amount on the skin around one eye only for short periods before using on or near eyes all day.
