The Indians out scored NCHS 8-0 down the stretch to take a 32-20 lead at intermission.

Montgomery County put the game away in the third quarter with a 24-13 scoring advantage to lead 56-23.

Homestead Exemption

Has your age crept up on you? If you are turning 65 years old this year, you can sign up for the Homestead Exemption for 1988. In addition to your age, you must own your home and live there to qualify for the exemption (only 1 exemption per household).

If you just bought your home recently, or forgot to sign up last year, you can still do so for 1988.

If you lost your husband or wife during the past year, you should call to see if a new form should be filled out for you. These forms should be filled out as soon as possible.
