## West End Park project is nearing completion

West End Park, Nicholas County's newest recreation spot, is getting the finishing touches this summer. The adjoining horse show ring, which is leased by the extension office. It is now ready for use by the community.

According to Terry Fraithier, 4-H Extension agent, seven lights have been erected and are now in working order to provide light for evening use.

He explained further, "These are Sodium Vapor lights (similar to those used in parking lots) and very different from those used in standard rings. They are approximately \$500 or more on up and monthly billings will be purchasing this type."

What was the estimated cost of the lights? "It was \$18,000 with an equal match from the Kentucky Department of Agriculture, Division of Shows and Fairs was used for the lights."

Fraithier said, "They will also provide up to \$20,000 for in-kind labor, which means that

any work we do out here can be reported and claimed up to that point."

Donations have also been a vital part of completing the show ring.

"Dr. Alan Hamon had his crew draw the posts. I and Mike Phillips (extension agent) put on the boards and the Tom Club painted them, other than."

"The one problem we do have is seeding."

"We have seeded for grass three or four times and tried different grasses, but we don't have any rain afterward so we don't have any grass," said Atkinson.

The biggest question in many Nicholas County's minds is why isn't West End Park being used by the Blackberry Festival instead of The Nicholas County Courthouse yard?

Atkinson said, "I do not think anyone has ever asked for the use of West End for the festival."

"But I think it is thought by the American Legion that if it is moved out of town and off the city streets, they can't make any money."

"Of course, we would be open to suggestions but the Parks and Recreation Board would have to look into it," Atkinson concluded.

One source has also suggested the County Fair and 4-H activities which could include a horse show, be combined with Blackberry Festival events.

"You see, we saved approximately half of the park, owned and operated by the Parks and Recreation Board and funded by the Nicholas County Fiscal Court and Carlisle City Council, is also on the move to completion."

According to Orville Atkinson, member of the proposed board and court, most of the work has been donated.

Atkinson said, "With the exception of laying the blocks

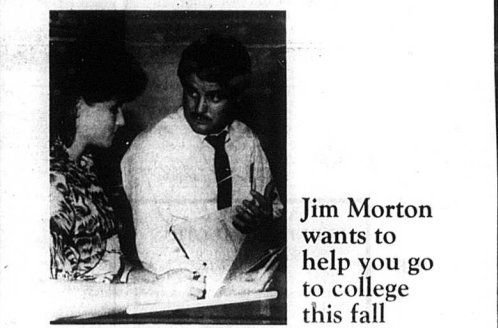
