After everyone ate and their meeting was held, there was only one contestant. She was 10-year old Rebecca McGlothlin. Dressed in a pink pinafore she performed a clogging routine.

This was the first performance by the girl. She started taking lessons from Scottie McKee about eight months ago. After four or five months of lessons from her, she started taking lessons from Teresa McClanahan in Mt. Sterling.

She performed to the song "Get Back to the Country" after various technical difficulties. She was judged by Beth Likens and Kay Marshall of Flemingsburg.

After her performance there was a drawing for several door prizes donated by local business.

Superintendent of Schools, Donald Elder, said, "With this funding, the literacy program can provide free materials to all of the student participants." According to Helen Hamilton, program coordinator, Operation Read has benefited those in Nicholas County and will continue to be there for those in need.

Hamilton said, "Another aspect for local literacy programs is to conduct schools for tutors." Before a volunteer can instruct a student, he or she must have 12 hours of training. "We have a cadre of

enthusiastic, trained tutors at present, but," she added, "We always need more as our program continues to grow."

According to Hamilton, the main qualification for becoming a tutor is the desire to help someone else. She said, "A tutor can be a member of your family or someone you never met."

Meanwhile, the program for those students in the program has astounded tutors in the program. "Hamilton said, "Since the program started, we have enrolled 25 students and some have jumped an amazing four reading levels a year."

"One student who has completed the program is now studying to enter the GED (General Education Diploma) program." Many potential students may not enter the program because they are older and feel learning new skills is out of their reach.

According to experts in the field of learning, older people learn faster because they are motivated to learn and are mature enough to handle the pressure of schoolwork. Hamilton said, "Some students have been promoted in their jobs, some are preparing to work in higher technological jobs and other students are learning to read so that they can be a part of their children's education."

She concluded, "None of this can happen unless local citizens volunteer their time as tutors, and anyone can be a tutor as long as they have that desire to help someone else."
