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Rash of rabies found in area Health officials warn

 Although no statewide warnings have been issued, Nicholas County is experiencing a rash of rabid animal diseases.

"There are two people in the county making the vaccine, right now," said Larry Trussell of the Nicholas County Health Department.

Rabid animals have been identified in four specific locations in Nicholas County: Blue Lick, Milltown, Redwell-Bertsville, and Conroy Road.

"While animals have been discovered in this area, Trussell

said it is possible for these animals to be found anywhere in the county.

"The primary animals we have found to have the disease are skunks and foxes, but it could be any animal."

What Trussell and other health department officials suggest is to avoid any strays animals.

If the animal is strange to you or your family, or if it is acting strange, do not have any contact with the animal.

Should it become necessary to kill any animal, make every effort not to shoot it in the head. The brain issue must be tested to determine if an animal is infected.

According to Trussell any animal, wild or domestic, can be infected with rabies.

"First, should have normal contacts of any animal, you may come in contact with."

 Many people believe the only profit made from high school sports is the simple enjoyment fee receive.

Well that's true, but it's also true that a winning season, especially in tournaments, pays for a high school athlete's education.

For example, Nicholas County made \$2,500.00 from its participation in the 10th Regional tournament at Mason County High School last week.

The entire tournament took in a total of \$30,000.

Don Elder, superintendent of Nicholas County Schools, said a good season does pay for a school.

"Oh, it certainly does. The money goes into the high school athletic fund," he said.

Elder said the money goes to:

Then a man named Joseph, from the city of Arimathea, who was a member of the Jewish Sanhedrin, was formed to follow, carrying Jesus' body.

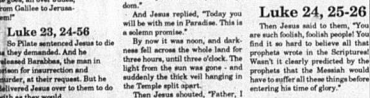
Others came trailing along behind, and many grief-stricken women.

 Nicholas County in the early 1980's after Superintendent Donald Elder received information from the Department of Education and asked Sue Kirby, long-time teacher at Nicholas County High School in the science field, to promote and develop the idea into an event that would benefit all Nicholas County High School seniors.

After countless tragedies of this same nature, the Kentucky State Police, in cooperation with the Department of Education, originated a project to prevent teen deaths. Project Graduation began in

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"We have juniors on the committee even though this is a senior activity so that they know what to expect next year and how to plan for it," Kirby said.

"The idea originated in the senior party and slowly evolved into an all night Project Graduation project to prevent teen deaths," said Kirby.

Seniors Neal Metcalf, Carol Bond, Henry White, and juniors Mary-Alicia Parsh and James Hill preside on the Project's committee.

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Metcalf, chairman, said, "It is seniors, on a voluntary basis, that come and stay all night to participate."
