Board airs kindergarten.....

 other day session, scheduled," Elder said.
 An argument against the full day schedule is children become too tired on the long day.
 Elder said, "I would say that as much as 30 percent of these students have already been in day care or baby-sitter services that are in the half day program already and the tiring is not a problem."
 "It has proven that children adjust to any program after a period of four to five weeks anyway."
 John Cleaver, board member said, "The only complaint I have heard on the half day is where we allow children to be picked up."
 Herbert Duncan added, "Really it is the problem of the baby-sitter being in the morning while the bus runs residence in the afternoon session."
 Much discussion followed on the term concerning residence.
 According to Cleaver, it is stated in the policy that the child shall be picked up and dropped off at the residence. The board has interpreted a residence to be an entire session.
 Elder said, "We can drop off a kindergarten child at a place other than his or her residence as long as that place is in his session, whether morning or afternoon."
 Lonnie Zachary said, "I do not think it is fair for a bus to pass right by a baby-sitters house and not be able to drop off that child there even if it is in another session."
 Elder replied, "We have guidelines for a reason. One person may say the bus passes right by my house then it is two houses down and next it is five houses down."
 "If we bend the policy now we will have to do it for everyone, but that policy can be changed and sessions and districts may be changed."

 Carol Haller, visitor to the meeting discussed and questioned the attendance policy applied to students.
 Heller does not believe five days are enough for a student to miss.
 "Sometimes when my children are sick but do not have a high fever I do not take them to the doctor but treat the symptoms at home."
 She added, "When my child has a cold or allergies we do not take her to the doctor unless it is absolutely necessary."
 "But now many people take their children to the doctor have the added expense which they cannot afford, because they need the excuse - not the doctor's attention."
 She said, "I also believe a rule that affects people's way of living should have had their input and hopefully this rule can be changed before next school year."
 William Hustler, board chairman said, "If there needs to be a change we will make them at the next meeting in June."
 Other motions passed were:
 - adopted certified salary schedule for 1988-89 school year with a 3 percent across the board increase as recommended by State Department of Education;
 - approved calendar for 1988-89 school year with opening day for teachers being August 18, 1988 and closing day May 24, 1989;
 - approved extended employment as listed;
 - approved FFA summer trips to Louisville, Ky., June 8-10; Hazardburg, Ky., July 11-15; and Ky. State Fair Area of The Year.

Approved Superintendent Elder to apply for all Federal Funding;
 - employed classified personnel as recommended;
 - approved request for Board Chairman to take Nicholas County Chess Team to Powell County, May 21 for invitational tournament;
 - renewed property insurance with Kentucky School Boards Property Trust through Great American Insurance Company with a 15 percent reduction;
 - approved retirement of Marguerite Eclon and paid 25 percent of salary for 140 unused sick leave days at total of \$2,296.60.
 The board also reviewed a petition signed by all NCES employees for payment of salary twice a month instead of once a month payments.
 The board saw no problem in granting the request but decided to wait and see if the high school wished this type of payment as well.
 Finally the board served Gerald Hammons with a tribute for being recognized as Kentucky FFA's "Principal of The Year."
