Engineers steam past Bluejackets

CARLELE - Estill County jumped to a 21-0 lead after one quarter, led 42-6 at intermission and went on to post a 49-29 win over Nicholas County in football action, last Friday.

In the season finale at NCHS, the Jackets were unable to stop hard throwing Jeremy Niese, a sophomore signalcaller for the Engineers.

Niese, son of head coach Hoover Niese, passed for over 200 yards, including two touchdowns, while rushing for another to lead the Engineers to a 5-5 season finish.

Jason Brandenburg handled in a 45 yard strike from Niese to open the game's scoring.

On the kickoff, Nicholas County fumbled, and just three plays later, Niese carried in from eight yards out.

With 8:29 to play in the first quarter, Nicholas County trailed, 14-0.

After another Estill County score, the quarter ended with the Engineers steaming with a 21-0 lead.

Nicholas County got on the scoreboard early in the second quarter on a three yard run by Frankie Johnson, but the extra point kick was no good, and the Jackets trailed 21-6.

Estill County added three more touchdowns in the second quarter, including a 45 yard strike by Niese to hold the big 42-6 lead at the break.

Following halftime ceremonies, where Tony McCarty was crowned homecoming queen for 1988, the Jackets reached back for some offense.

Estill County did add one touchdown in the third quarter, but the Jackets' defense toughened and stopped the hard running Engineers.

The final score of the game came on a 25 yard fumble recovery - return by Daniel Brown.

Collier Mathes took the third handoff on a triple reverse as Nicholas County counted two points on the conversion.

It was too little, too late, though as time ran out on Nicholas County, as the Jackets finished the 1988 season 3-8.

"We were hard pressed to stop him. He throws well and has excellent receivers," Barr added.
