Nicholas board has special meeting

The Nicholas County Board of Education met in called session on November 2, at the board office at 7:30 p.m. All members were present.

The following orders were recommended by Superintendent Donald Elder.

Motion by Anderson, to go into closed session to hold an expulsion hearing.

Motion by Duncan, seconded by Cleaver, to allow Blue Licks Lodge #495 F. & A. M. use of elementary gym and cafeteria on March 30 for district meeting.

Motion by Anderson, seconded by Zechary, to contribute \$1,000 for high school library toward purchasing of a Canon Microprinter 50.

Motion by Cleaver, seconded by Duncan, to allow Carlisle Rotary Club to use elementary school Cafeteria on November 18, 1988 for community project a certificate as to the appropriate tax exemption having been executed and filed.

Motion by Zechary, seconded by Anderson, to employ Patty Hatton as Elementary lunchroom monitor and place Dennis Norton on sub-teacher list.

Motion by Cleaver, seconded by Zechary, to allow Tiger Cubs use of elementary space on fourth Monday of each month for meeting.

Motion by Duncan, seconded by Zechary, to approve board members, Superintendent, and board attorney attending state and National School Board Meetings.

Motion by Anderson, seconded by Duncan, to advertise for bids for the Building of Nicholas High School baseball field.

extensions around 32 feet by 30 feet, with doors between 12 and 14 feet.

John Eaton reported the last inspection of the landfill was a month ago and the EPA inspectors seemed to be satisfied with the work. Magistrate Earl Lee Plank noted that it did look 100 percent better.

The issue of uniforms, which was brought up at the last Fiscal Court meeting, surfaced again. The Court agreed get the uniforms if employees will pay half of the \$3.45 cost and \$1.50 weekly delivery charge. Magistrate Floyd Russell estimated the cost to the county at \$272.

Magistrate Russell again brought up the issue of mandatory retirement at age 70. He suggested that this take effect as of December 31 and that part-time employees not be affected. The motion did not pass.

A special meeting was called for November 21, at 7:00 p.m. to discuss the county's long range solid waste program. County attorney Jack Conley informed the Court that several programs concerning waste must be implemented by November 20.

The necessary programs include securing a county environmental enforcement officer, appointing a legal site investigator and open dump coordinator, as well as a public information campaign about solid waste.

In other business: The Court passed a resolution redefining all Nicholas County Hospital Corporation first mortgage bonds. From now on, all income from the Mary Mathers fund, established in the will of C.W. Mathers, will go directly to Johnson Mathers Health Care Inc. in a Depreciation Account.

**In Colorado
Burke enjoys high county hunting**

Most deer hunters don't camp with "all the comforts of home," which include, for John Burke, a woodburning stove and hot shower in the middle of the wilderness.

Thus again, most deer hunters aren't stalking elk and mule deer in the Flatops Wilderness Area in Colorado.

Burke's tent included these luxuries although about 1500 miles west of "home" and 11,000 feet above sea level. Interestingly enough, Burke said he was still on the same latitude as Carlisle.

Still going on Kentucky time, the break of day was 8:30, which allowed him to sleep in before hunting.

The camp site he chose was 15 miles "on the edge" from Glenwood Springs. However, the journey in his four-wheel drive truck was about 60 miles and took four hours.

"It was extremely rough," he said. "There was mud, rocks, trees and the incline was terrible."

Even walking a half mile to a hunting sight was an ordeal, because of the altitude, he said. It took three hours to walk that distance, due to the fact that 1000 feet of the walk went straight down and another 1000 feet went straight up, he said. After walking a few hundred feet, he had to stop and catch his breath, he said. The oxygen supply is somewhat limited at that altitude, he explained.

Burke described the hunting he did as "trippy hunting." About five trips ago, he decided he wasn't going to shoot anything that he wouldn't hang on his wall. This trip rewarded him with a mount of a mule deer. He had 6 or seven points to a side of his antlers, which were 42 inches long. The deer stood six feet at the shoulder and dressed at 500 or 600 pounds.

"The hunting part isn't the interesting part of the trip," he said, "watching the wilderness is the best part."

He said he saw three different sets of elk fighting and two sets of deer having it out.

"I've been going out there since 1970 and I've never seen that before," he said.

He has seen coyotes, as they run away, he added. In 11 trips to the western United States, he's never seen the bears and mountain lions many fear. The conflicts between animal and human usually results from carelessness.

"You can't leave stuff laying around," he said, referring to food items. This trip, as he carried home the head and hide of the

mule deer, he was patrolled by a bald eagle.

"He went from tree to tree, in the moonlight, screaming at me," Burke said. "I was in Wilmer Halcomb. Licenses, for out of state hunters, are pricey. His elk license was about \$210 and the mule-deer license was about \$120.
