Special Needs Adoption Program recognized this week

Governor to sign proclamation declaring this National Adoption Week

Kentucky Celebrates Building Families Through Adoption. This is the theme heard throughout the Commonwealth as it observes National Adoption Week, November 20-26, 1988.

The Special Needs Adoption Program (SNAP), along with scores of social workers, are making a concerted effort this week to dramatize the plight of over 200 children in Kentucky who are waiting to be adopted by a permanent family.

In the two and a half years Sheree Combs has been a social worker in Nicholas County, she recalls only one adoption taking place.

These are real children, waiting right now. Our purpose is to make them visible to the public. These children need foster families as well as permanent families for a child in need.

The SNAP program is a permanent adoption," she said.

The program originated in 1979 when the Cabinet for Human Resources recognized that children had a right to a permanent family. When a child's biological family is unable to meet the needs of their family, then adoption becomes the goal.

SNAP has shown dramatic success in recruiting adoptive families. Since 1979 over 500 previously unadoptable children now have permanent homes.

This week has many activities planned to help the community become aware of the over 200 children who have experienced abuse, neglect and abandonment.

Children who fall under the special needs category are over 10 years old, are minority children, some have disabilities and some have illnesses.

Governor Wilkinson will sign a proclamation declaring November 20-26 National Adoption Week in Kentucky. "SNAPpy Hour" receptions are planned to honor families who have adopted special needs children and radio and TV programs will feature interviews and presentations throughout the week.

Trying to dispel rumors about adoption is a big part of SNAP's efforts, Combs said. Families do not have to be rich, own their own homes, they do not have to be certain ages and they do not have to be married.

The families being sought have a stable home life, problem solving abilities, and a commitment to the child they adopt.

Combs said Nicholas County would be a great place for these children to be adopted, since they tend to live in rural areas.

The adoption process involves attending an informational meeting, six preparation sessions and completion of a home evaluation.

All of these things can be accomplished within four to six months and there are no fees charged by SNAP.

Combs said she was willing to make appointments with people to discuss the program or send information to people taking the special needs children into consideration.

Farm Credit Services has announced today that stockholders will be pleased with the merger proposal. Cattlebarbers were organized by joining the two organizations, stock requirements will be reduced to 3 percent.

At present, the stock requirement in PCA is 10 percent, and 5 percent on FLBA loans.

If the proposal is approved, stockholders who have loans with the association will have their stock converted to the new stock program.

Stockholders with adjustable or variable rate loans will have all stock above the 3 percent requirement retired. Stockholders with fixed or floating rate loans will not be eligible for the automatic stock retirement, but will have their stock requirement reduced at the end of their fixed term.

John P. Fay says anyone with questions about what would happen to their stock should call the office at 289-2228 for a full explanation of the conversion and retirement process.

Fay says the merger won't cause any disruption of service to members.

Farm Credit Services made the major change when stockholders voted to consolidate operations in 1985. We combined staff and offices then. This merger will mainly affect our bookkeeping. Members will see virtually the same service as they have for the last three years."

The merger vote is a result of the Agricultural Credit Act of 1987 which called for votes to take place between members of all PCAs and FLBAs serving "substantially the same territory". Prior to the passage of the Act, a merger of the two organizations was prohibited.

Since 1986, the two organizations have been jointly managed and staffed and operated under the name Farm Credit Services.

Stockholders will receive full disclosure about the merger by mail in December. The information will include a proxy ballot for a mail-in vote, as well as an invitation to a special stockholder meeting which will take place January 9, 1989.

The PCA and FLBA are both farmer-owned cooperatives and were formed by congress in the early part of the century to finance loans for livestock, operating expenses and capital purchases. The FLBA makes long-term loans for real estate and housing.
