**PREVENTING EYE INJURIES**  
Half of all eye injuries - and there are over one million each year - occur in the home. Many could be avoided.  
Put chemical mixtures with spray nozzles out of reach of young children. Even adults who use such things as oven cleaner or hair spray must be careful that no one is nearby when these mixtures are used.  
It's a good idea to wear safety goggles when working with chemicals in the home workshop or garden. The same is true when using power tools in the garden or workshop which have the ability to fling dangerous fragments a great distance. Eye guards also are a good idea when playing fast-moving sports, such as racquetball.  
Children should be taught to use toys properly, and toys should be appropriate for their age. Avoid projectile toys such as darts and pellet guns. Show your child how to handle pencils and scissors safely.  
In case of an injury, call your eye care professional promptly and, if indicated, go to the hospital emergency room.

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**NOVEMBER 22, 1963 - A DAY AMERICA REMEMBERS**

**America's 35th president is slain**

*While the nation held its breath, the word from Dallas finally was given . . .*

**The president is dead**

This is dedicated to those who did not know JFK - and to those who did.

It was a bright, sunny afternoon in the Texas town of Dallas. The young, well-thought-of president of the United States, John F. Kennedy, was on a political trip through the Longhorn State. Kennedy had been in office two years, 10 months and two days - his political future appeared bright. This was November 22, 1963. Kennedy along with his wife Jackie, John Connally and his wife were in a limousine on Elm Street. The car had just passed in front of the Texas School Book Depository on its way to the Texas Trade Mart, where he was scheduled as a luncheon speaker. It has never been established exactly what happened, however shot after shot, seriously injuring Connally and killing John Kennedy as he lay slumped in his wife's lap. Kennedy was clinging to life as he entered Parkland Hospital, however, the first physicians to reach him knew it was too late. They did everything possible to revive him, but it was no use. Lyndon Baines Johnson became the 36th president of the United States officially at 2:38 p.m., central standard time, about two hours after the assassination.

The oath of office was administered by Federal Judge Sarah T. Hughes, the first woman in history to swear in a president. About 30 people were crowded in the hot and stuffy cabin of the plane. Air Force One, including Kennedy's widow, as Johnson was sworn into office. Lee Harvey Oswald, who was arrested as a suspect in the killing of Kennedy, was later shot by Jack Ruby, as he was being moved in Dallas. Thus, there was never any positive way to know exactly how involved the plot to kill Kennedy actually was. . . .

I would like to express my thoughts and memories of November 22, 1963.  
We were living in St. Petersburg, Florida. Our oldest son Charles Eads was in the marines in Paris Island, South Carolina, and he was home on leave. At the time President Kennedy was shot I was doing my laundry and was in my dining room table. I had my t.v. on watching the motorcade, when he was shot and he slumped over in his wife's lap. I almost fainted, it scared me so bad that I had to go sit down. At first I thought it wasn't so - but people began to scream, and they announced immediately on the t.v. that the president was shot. I will never forget how all the media worked those four days - that was all that was on t.v. It just makes you feel like it was one of your own family that had died. It was a very sad thing when my wife with two small children standing so stern - not knowing what her future held. It was about the same feeling when Franklin Roosevelt died - only different then - I did not have t.v. - and it was very sad for a great president to die while in office - but with President Kennedy's death it was all on the news. A very touching experience for me and my family - and my country. Thank You

He attended Harvard University, graduating in 1940. He was a lieutenant in the U.S. Navy, during World War II and was decorated for heroism while commanding PT Boat 109 in the South Pacific in 1943. He studied law and was also a newspaper reporter. He entered Democratic politics, served in the U.S. House of Representatives 1947-53. He married Jacqueline Lee Bouvier, 24, on September 12, 1953. The couple had two sons and one daughter, a son, Patrick, preceded Kennedy in death. His writings of Profiles in Courage won him a Pulitzer Prize for biography in 1957. He campaigned as a candidate unsuccessfully for vice president in 1960, won his party's nomination for president in 1960, and narrowly defeated Richard Nixon for the nation's top post. As president Kennedy applied himself with great vigor to his New Frontier.

While riding in motorcade in Dallas, Texas, November 22, 1963, he was shot (supposedly by Lee Harvey Oswald) and died immediately. He was 46. Kennedy was tall, 6-foot, red-haired and handsome, according to some. Jack and JFK were among his nicknames. His wife, who survives him, was born in Southampton, N.Y., July 28, 1929. Kennedy is buried in Arlington National Cemetery, Virginia.
