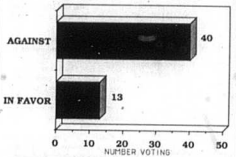
In addition, three of those responding clearly indicated classroom aides should also receive the increase in pay.

## Hospital Corporation able to resolve debt

The Hospital Corporation met last Tuesday and passed a resolution concerning the sale mortgage bonds issued to build the nursing home in 1963.

Jack Conley, County Attorney, explained that enough money has been accrued in the bond fund to pay off the debt now instead of in 2003.

This will be a "considerable savings" for the nursing home since they will not have to pay rent which was put into the bond fund and the income from the C.W. 45000 for early redemption, but Conley explained this

standard operating procedure.

The Hospital Corporation is made up of members of the Fiscal Court, who act as directors. Conley explained that at the time the deed and mortgage were drawn up, the Fiscal Court was not allowed to participate in business dealings like this one.

The Hospital Corporation was a hospital, which allows the court the power over the hospital.

The Hospital Corporation declined to deed the property over to Johnson. Mathers Healthcare Inc. since one Continued on page 6
